Nagy asked UN Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold to place the Hungarian crisis on the General Assembly's agenda as a priority issue for debate.

Earlier Nagy took on the job of Foreign Minister.

Josze Cardinal Mindszenty conferred today with a delegation from Nagy's coalition government. The Cardinal demanded formation of a Christian Democratic party with cabinet representation.
