Youth Tells of **Child Labor** In Deleware



Stalin...Hitler's Apprentice In the Second World War



Robert Montgomery scores again with an extremely interesting performance in the "Earl of Chicago." He plays the role of a bigtime Chicago gangster who discovers that he is the heir to an English Earldom and goes abroad to claim his rich estate.

"Silky" Kilmount is not a run of the mill gang-ster. He got his nickname, Silky, because of his fondness for smooth, fine things, because he loved having things of silk about him-especially if they covered a shapely pair of legs, Also, out of the ordinary for a mobster, he hates guns. They deal out a mean and evil death. A man's life may ooze out from a ludicrously small hole. And fear of so snakelike a death makes him sicken and flinch at the sight of a gun.

There's the character—a smooth and strangely sensitive man, ruthless and cocky at the same time. And the twist to the story, of course, is making this man play the role of an English lord, against the background of tradition, the hallowed custom of the House of Peers.

GANGSTER IN ENGLAND

The gangster souirms and sweats in his unaccustomed surrounding. Add to this-Edward Arnold, as his attorney, out to avenge a frame-up Kilmount worked on him in the past. When Arnold has trapped Kilmount into being forced to stay in England, the gangster kills him. The weapon, of course, is a gun.

Montgomery does a smooth and clever job as the unusual gangster. The chief fault of the picture is that there isn't enough plot to maintain the picture at an even pace. Consequently it had to be drawn out and become very thin in the middle. Due to this lack, even Montgomery's performance seemed to drag in spots. Although it doesn't match up to "Night Must Fall' it packs a clever punch of its own.

MAGIC BULLET

Another actor proves his versatility in a current movie. Edward G. Robinson, famed for his gang-ster portrayals, reverses his field with a consistent and believable performance in "Dr. Ehrlich's Magic Bullet.'

As the scientist who compounded a cure for syphillis. Robinson does a thoroughly warm and engaging job. The problem of syphillis is handled for the first time on the screen in a popularly distributed movie. It is presented in a sober and thoughtful fashion. It is surprising how much entertainment value can be found in the plodding, experimental work of a scientist.

Special praise is due to two grand old performers. Albert Basserman, a German exile, does a moving and heart-warming job as old Dr. Koch. And Maria Ouspenskaia makes movie magic in the few minutes she is on the screen.

When Stalin made his pact with Hitler last August, he initiated one of the most astounding political situations in modern history.

Yesterday depicted by the Stalinists as a marauding pirate whose hands were stained with the blood of thousands of workers, as the representative of a bestial system, today Hitler suddenly underwent a miraculous transformation-at least in the propoganda of Stalin and his stooges-into a benighted champion of peace whose soul had undergone a cleansing. So thorough has been Hitler's "reformation" that the Stalinists now deem him worthy of their practical and political support.

This is not a mere contention. It is a fact, admitted by the Stalinists themselves. In this article we shall give a brief outline of the sordid picture of Stalin acting as the accomplice and agent of Hitler.

"As I have said, our relations with Germany have radically improved. Here the development has proceeded along the line of strengthening our friendly relations, extending our practical co-operation and rendering Germany political support in her efforts for Peace." (Molotoff's Speech — October 31, in WORLD NEWS & VIEWS.)

What a damning admission! Practical and political support says Molotoff, to . . . Hitler. Germany, says Molotoff, makes efforts . . . "for Peace!"

STALIN-EASTERN FLANK OF HITLER'S ARMY

The "practical co-operation" took the form of:

1) Trade treaty by which Stalin will give Hitler war materials, especially oil.

2) The invasion of Poland by the Red Army from the East was a mop-up job in the service of Hitler and permitted Hitler to send thousands of troops to the Westwall.

3) The invasion of Finland and reduction of the Baltic countries to colonies of Stalin. This served as the prelude to Hitler's subjugation of Scandinavia.

And what is the "political support" which Molo-toff (Stalin's mouthpiece) promises? Merely this: the Kremlin and the Stalinists throughout the world promise to rationalize and justify the acts of Hitler in the eyes of the workers in each country.

Let us see how this worked out in each instance:

1) Polish Invasion: Hitler's Peace Crusade

In the Polish campaign, the Stalinists made Hitler appear as crusader of peace and order: Said the Moscow Izvestia, and repeated the equally notorious Daily Worker of October 10:

"The government of the USSR and the government of Germany assumed the task of bring-ing peace and order to the territory of former Poland to secure for the people living in this territory a peaceful existence in accordance with their national characteristicts."

What shameless cynicism! So Stalin and Hitler brought "peace and order" to Poland!

When Hitler invaded Czechoslovakia, the Stalinists protested unto heaven about how Czechoslovakia had been raped by Hitler. When Hitler invaded Poland, they served as his eastern flank. Why this change? In the first case, Stalin was allied with England and France and was acting as their agent. In the second case, Stalin had shifted to Hitler and was doing his bidding.

When was he right? In neither case! He was the agent of reactionary imperialist robbers in both cases; he did not and does not deserve the confidence of workers and youth in either case!

2) Hitler: Angel of Peace Without Wings.

The question of who is "guilty" of starting the war is a touchy one. Who fired the first shot, or dropped the first bomb is very unimportant. What is really important is that both sides fight a reactionary imperialist war for profits and that the workers should support neither side. That is what a real revolutionist should say.

But in the Protocol Statement attached to the German-Soviet agreement signed by Herr Ribbentrop and Tovarish Molotoff, we read:

"But should the efforts for peace of both governments fail, then the fact would be established that England and France are responsible for continuation of the war . . ." (N.Y. Times, Sept. 29)

Again, the same Molotoff wrote:

"Today, Germany is in the position of a state which is striving for the earliest termination of the war and for peace . . ." (World Views and News, November 4)

Do you see now how Stalin and his stooges play the roles of apologists for Hitler, just as they did before for Chamberlain. The role of bootlicker for imperialism fits Stalin well.

3) Hitler-and Stalin-Bring Peace to Norway

Stalin has played the same role in Norway. The Stalinists place the entire responsibility on the shoulders of the Allies (instead of the shoulders of both sides, where it belongs.) The Daily Worker of April 7 writes:

". . . it was England's violation of Norwegian neutrality that brought about the present situation . . ." Of Hitler, not a word!

Hitler, it must be admitted, knows how to "award" his friends. In the Daily Worker we read, with regard to that section of Norway occupied by Hitler

"The labor movement can legally continue its work and despite strict military censorship can publish its newspapers. Up to the present only the Communists continue publishing their paper.'

We can well understand why the Norwegian Stalinists are a legal party in Hitler-occupied Norway while even ordinary capitalist papers have been suppressed. Hitler knows how to distinguish between friends and foes.

Drop A Tear For The Unhappy Rich

If some readers have found the conditions of American youth as depicted in various articles in the Challenge depressing, they should not take it too much to heart. While it cannot be denied that 10-12 million hands still lie idle, that 5 million sharecroppers and transient farm-laborers are hopelessly involved in poverty, that 6 million youth are locked out of industry-that shouldn't bother you too much.

For you can always think of America's Sixty Families, and the life they lead. And you can have the consolation of knowing that if you can't buy that new summer hat at \$1.98 or can't afford a new tie, why then at least the younger generation of the 60 Families—known as the Smart Set—is living —shall we say—comfortably.

Just to prove to the doubters and cynics that not everybody in America suffers from the depression, let me give you some facts:

In 1929, the total income of 513 Americans was \$1,212,099,000 while the gross price received by more than 2 million farmers for all wheat and cotton produced in that year was \$1,191,000,000. Again, during the year of 1929 cotton goods workers received \$753 each in wages while the 38 richest persons took \$9,494,600 each.

No Need For Cynicism

Now a cynic-in which class the reader undoubtedly falls-would shake his head and talk about inequality. But consider, if we ignore the wages of the millions and merely think of the 60 Ruling Families-isn't America a wonderful country after all?

You think, no doubt, that you have problems trying to find a job and making a living. But suppose you made 9 million smackers a year-just suppose!-what would you do with all the money? Isn't that a problem?

While the Forgotten Men were blissfully dining out of ash-cans, the poor, unfortunate Rich were trying to solve their problem of what to do with their money. Mr. and Mrs. Doherty gave a party for their daughter that cost a mere \$250,000. Bar-bara Hutton gave a party that cost \$100,000, at which 2,000 cases of champagne were distributed to 1.000 guests. But do you think that really solved the problem? No siree! The profits kept rolling in.

Cast of A Bath

If some of you cynics think that the Ruling 60 Families get their hands dirty in amassing their fortunes, then rest assured that they are personally addicted to cleanliness. In fact, the 60 Families have gone to extraordinary lengths to keep clean. They have payed as much as \$12,000 for gold and onyx marble bathtubs; as much as \$250,000 for swimming pools. Now just between us, do the poor people exert themselves so much, financially, to keep clean?

People have been making noise about housing. They talk about slums. But the 60 Families are doing their very best to prevent slums. They set an **example** by not living in slums. In fact, the Du Pont family lives in a 200-room mansion (running water with steam) which is valued at \$75,000,000; the residence of Morgan cost \$30,000,000. And the Du Pont family is doing its bit to ease unemployment. The number of servants employed by the Du Ponts exceeds that employed by the King of England.

S next time you talk about the Ruling 60 Families, just be careful. Remember what they are doing for humanity!

With jobs still one of your promises, with the right to a free education, and the means to learn a trade still the forgotten slogans of the last presidential campaign, we are faced with the prospect of having to lay down our lives in a new World War, one which your diplomats and statesmen admit will be longer and more bloody than the last.

Nye Spills The Beans

This is indeed a bitter pill for us to swallow. It was only six or seven years ago when many of us had just entered high school that Senator Nye's investigation spilled the beans about the last war. It was then that most of us discovered for the first time that John P. Morgan, who was the purchasing agent for the Allies at a commission of some thirty million dollars, was the man influential in obtaining loans for the Allies from this country. We learned that some two billion dollars had been loaned to the Allies and that it was to save this investment for which America entered the war in 1917. That was why so many of our fathers and uncles were killed and wounded.

It was a shock to us, youth of thirteen, fourteen and fifteen, to learn that all we had been told about a war to make the world safe for "democracy" was "bunk" and that patriotism meant fighting for Morgan's investments. Most of us have not forgotten the accounts of the Nye investigation which we discussed in school. But some of you politicians apparently think we have.


camps on the tremendous sum of 371/2c per day and you put the camp under the supervision of four army reserve officers. The army has been agitating consistently to provide rifles and military training to the CCC boys and by your silence and tacit consent you warn us that in the near future Congress will urge such a plan which will turn the CCC into an army barracks and make soldiers of those of us who were unfortunate enough to be inveigled or forced into enlisting.

The N.Y.A.

Hundreds of thousands of us cannot attend high school because our families cannot provide us with carfare, clothes and lunch money. You have met this situation with a miserable pittance of five or six dollars a month from NYA. You pay unemployed youth the tremendous wage of twenty dollars a month from this same agency. The American Youth Act, emasculated though it has been during the last few years does not pass Congress.

All over the country there are factories standing idle with machinery rusting. Many of us have been desperate in our attempts to learn how to operate some of those machines, to get a chance to learn some kind of

trade, to get some mechanical training so that we do not have to work at "dead end" jobs for the rest of our lives, earning twelve or thir-



scarce today as it was six years ago.

Right To Vote

At the age of eighteen our families send us out to look for jobs. You expect us to contribute to their support, to assume all the responsibilities of grown-ups. You do not give us the right to decide who shall represent us in the Congress where our money is spent, who shall sit in the White House and decree whether we stay at home and get jobs or go abroad to fight for "democracy". We can work, we can die in your wars, but we cannot vote.

Of course you have good reason for this. Wasn't it Mrs. Roosevelt who said in a speech against the Ludlow Amendment last year that she was opposed to giving the America npeople the right to vote on whether or not America should send troops to fight abroad? Didn't she give, as one of her reasons, that if this right were conceded it would be only logical for youth of eighteen to demand the right to vote on this question and that once such a right were granted there was a danger that American "unity" might be disrupted in war time?

try between the ages of eighteen and twenty-one because most of these are untrained in any vital war production. They have not had the time or



the opportunity to become skilled craftsmen. Most of them, as a matter of fact are not working. They are least important to you.

We know how soon you will reach this stage. Look at England. The war started only last September. It moved very slowly all during

the fall and winter. This May, (the war was only eight months old) the Government announced a second draft of two million soldiers, lowering the age level to nineteen. It is safe to predict that by this fall, the flower of England's nineteen yearolds will be dying on a field in Europe.

You are planning the same fate for American youth. In the last six years you have taken a group of three million young men and denied them the right to learn a trade and get a job. You have graduated them into a country of unemployment and refused them the opportunity to work. Now you are planning to enter a war which will result in their extermination.

These, Mr. Politicians, are more than Industrial Mobilization plans, the polite name by which you call them. They are goose-step plans. They will bring a denial of freedom of speech and organization. The right of assemblage will disappear. These plans will bring us closer to fascism in America. They cap the climax of six years of unemployment and misery for our generation.

Your Aim and Ours

What are you fighting with all your diplomatic gestures in the world struggle between the Allies and the Moscow-Berlin axis? You say you are fighting totalitarian dictatorship, a system in which a man doesn't have the right to speak as he thinks, to work at the occupation he desires, to earn enough for feeding and clothing his family. Most of these are to be found within the confines of our own country. For six years you have failed to fight it at home and now you plan to put us into uniform, give us rifles and send us to fight for Morgan and DuPont abroad.

these countries become bolder and bolder even while their own politicians jail them and kill them.

The Third Camp


You would have us believe that there are only two sides in this war, the side of the "democracies" and the side of the "dictatorships". There are three sides, Messrs. Politicians. You have forgotten our side, the side which demands jobs and not guns, the right to live and not the order to die, the privilege of learning and not the duty of destroying all that the world has learned and created in many years of study and labor.

When you read this letter and the many other like it which you receive every day, when you see picket lines of young people with these demands, when you are alarmed by demonstrations and strikes, you will know that our side is expressing itself.

When you rea dthe confidential reports of young Irishmen marching against English rule, young Indians preparing for revolt under iron British rule, young Russians and young Germans who are caught inciting to disloyalty against Stalin and Hitler, be reminded of the third side. It is this third camp which has prevented you from being more openly pro-war than you are these many months since last fateful September. It is this feeling that some of you would like to take advantage of in your speeches, when you claim opposition to any plans for sending "our boys" overseas. Already, however, your Party, leaders have warned you against going too far, some of them calling it "near treason".

We Are The Future

You have already placed this country in the war with both feet financially. American industry is rapidly gearing itself to meet the orders of the Allied purchasing commissions. But remember when you convene your convention that this hasn't solved any of our problems.



We want jobs. We want trade schools. We want education. We want the right to vote on war at the age of eighteen. For years your Parties, your government, your system of society has

failed to provide these rights.

Your Budgets and Our Needs

For six years now you have been debating in Congress ways of spending the money you get from our parents, six years when we have been growing into young men and women, when we have so urgently needed the opportunities to educate and train ourselves for trades and professions, when these opportunities

have been persistently denied us. Every year we have graduated two million strong, into unemployment and hopelessness while you have spent millions for battleships and bombers.

Your Congress took over a broken down eco-


nomic machine, a machine which denied seven million unemployed young people the right to work. What have you done for us? You gave us the CCC which pays the miserable wage of \$30 a month of which you turn over \$25 to our families so that you should be able to give them less money for relief. You feed one of us in these

Goose-Step Plans

Mrs. Roosevelt knows that our vote would be against American entrance into the war. We have good reason for that. You have plans for American entrance into this war. You say of course that your purpose is really to prepare so that we can stay out. You are quite well-equipped for the day we enter, however. Mobilization-Day, you call it. On that fateful day, according to a set of blue prints in a steel box in Washington, three million of us will be put into uniform-the first draft. In our country there are about five million males between the ages of twenty-one and twenty-five. Out of these five million you will select three million who are not working in some vital industry connected with the furtherance of the war.

In the second draft, however, you will send almost all of the three million males in our coun-

We have nothing against the young people of any of the warring camps-neither in England nor Germany; France nor Italy; Russia nor Finland; nor in any of the countries of the world. They were fooled into putting



We will fight together with the youth of Ger-

many, England, France, Italy, and Russia, but not under your leadership or the leadership of their own tricksters and boss politicians. They don't want this war any more than we do and they show it by their lack of enthusiasm and quiet acceptance of the inevitable, as your papers describe it every day. And some of them do not accept it as quietly as you would like. In Ireland and India they are already beginning to march in the uniforms of rebel armies, against the war and British rule. In Germany and vassal Czechoslovakia, in serf Poland already there are rumbles of revolt. Every day the young revolutionists of

We will fight for and create a government and a society that will be our own, that will give us jobs, security and peace. Such a government is a government of the workers and farmers. Such a society is Socialism.

For years you, together with the capitalist politicians of Europe have acted a play on the stage of world politics, while behind the scenes Morgan and DuPont, Krupp and Creusot have been running the show, making us fight for what they won and lost in the last war. We, together with the youth of England, France, Germany and Russia will put an end to this mockery. With this war you begin your last performance!

NEGRO YOUTH WON'T DE TO

Baseball Is All-American Sport-But Not For **Colored Athletes**

The baseball season is well under way now. But underneath the fanfare of the opening day and the excitement and anticipation of the new pennant race, America's national pastime operates on the same old Jim Crow principle-the iron ban against Negro players in the major leagues.

In our last article we reviewed the record of Negro athletes in the sports life of this country. No one dares challenge the equal ability and spirit of Negro youth. If they have not been banned from baseball on grounds of inability, then we have the right to ask the reason for Not this totally reactionary and undemocratic practise.

No official explanation is ever forthcoming. But it is whispered, apologetically, that since many ball players hail from the south, they will refuse to have Negroes as teammates. By and large, this particular in the 3rd camp-the camp of the workers of every country.

lament is strictly the malarkey. Last summer many major leaguers were quizzed on this very problem.

Gabby Hartnett, manager of the Chicago Cubs said, ". . . if man-agers were given permission, there'd be a mad rush to sign up Negroes.' Bill McKechnie, manager of the Cincinnati Reds: "... if permitted, I'd be glad to sign some on the Reds." Leo Durocher, pilot of "them amazing bums" the Brook-lyn Dodgers: "I would certainly use those great Negro stars on the Brooklyn Dodgers. If the big bosses said okay, I would not hesitate for a single minute."

Ford Frick, Presidetn of the National League declared that there was no rule which prohibited the signing up of Negro players in his League. Then who is that permission to be won from to break the Jim Crow rule? But first let us deal with another of the unofficial, funds for white schools: hinted explanations offered by the clique that runs big league baseball.

This other sob story is that fans will boycott the game if Negro stars play. I remember that several years ago the New York Yankees had Ben Chapman, a flashy outfielder from Georgia, patrolling left field. When the fans 'needled" him for an error as fans have a way of doing, Chapman would single out Negro and Jewish spectators for his snappy retorts. When the debate with this Georgia Peach (who had too much fuzz on to suit the fans) reached the pop bottle and fist fight stage, the Yankee front office traded Chapman to Washington. (We can't help wondering why this nasty lad was more comfortable in the nation's capital.)

Recently, Jake Powell, another Yankee outfielder, has been given the "pop bottle cure" for Jim Crow remarks he made. Many incidents similar to these indicate that the fans will not boycott Negro play-

for Democracy, Stop Fascism, Smash the Countries Which Practise Racial Discrimiantion-are very attractive for Negro youth.

Is it any wonder? These are the things which every young Negro believes in.

But they are lies, vile, hypocritical lies. The war of England, France, Belgium and tomorrow America will not be fought for any of these things. They are wars for profits, for the right to exploit the backward sections of the world, including the sections where Negroes are oppressed and enslaved.

There is no reason why any Negro should support Hitler, of course. But there is no reason why a Negro youth should support the Allies either.

Support England which oppresses and enslaves the Negro people of Rhodesia, Southwest Africa, Union of South Africa etc.? Support France which oppresses the Negroes of Equatorial Africa? Support "poor, little Belgium" the murderer of thousands of Negroes in the

Not on your life! That's not the kind of "democracy" we are willing to give up our lives for!

Negro youth have no stake in either of the 2 warring imperialist camps! Negro youth must take their place side by side with white youth

EFEND LYNCH "DEMOCRACY" spokesmen of the Roosevelt government, are being used to entice Negro youth as well as white youth. The slogans being used—A Holy War **Calls For Militant Struggle** For Negro Youth Rights

The first annual conference held by the College Section of the Na-tional Association for the Advancement of Colored People on March 29-31 was unfortunately not reported at the time in our press, but it nevertheless deserves comment.

Over 100 delegates were present, of whom less than 10 were from non-colored organizations. Most delegates were from the Va .-- West Va. area and not the deep south, and represented Negro college groups.

The delegates expressed a tremendous interest in militant mass activities for Negro youth rights. There was little lie-down-and-take-it mood; this was a group of Negro youth genuinely interested in finding a way to real freedom. For example, the hero of the conference was William Anderson of Greenville, South Carolina. His NAACP Youth Council of 45 in a town with a Negro population of 14,000, campaigned

to get out the Negro vote. For the first time in 70 years, Negroes turned out to vote. During the campaign, Anderson was kidnapped and beaten up, his friends were threatened; but despite this, over 250 Negroes registered and over 50 voted, more than in the previous 70 years combined. This was the kind of fight that typified the spirit of the delegates.

The panel discussions were excellent. The panels on Politics and Government and on Security and Opportunity showed a militant interest in the fight for jobs and peace. (In the latter panel, Frank Brill, delegate from the YPSL (4th Int.) was chairman.) Resolutions supporting labor organization in the South, attacking FDR's foreign policy, calling for "Jobs not Guns" were passed. A resolution de-manding that the people be allowed to vote on war was passed.

A resolution condemning Chamberlin-Reynaud; Hitler-Stalin in the war was tabled by the narrow vote of 24-19. The few Stalinists present were among those voting to table since the resolution correctly labeled Stalin as a stooge of Hitler.

Role of Stalinists

The conference was, on the whole, successful precisely because the Stalinist played a minor role. They were present, but only as a small, well - organized minority. They could not sabotage really popular ideas such as the war-referendum, but where the issue was a doubt-ful one in the eyes of the delegates, such as affiliation to the Stalinistcontrolled American Youth Congress, they were in a position to

. Conditions have been getting worse, not better. In 1900 the Negro schools got 81% of what the white schools got; in 1930, they got 36%

of what the white schools did. That is how democracy marches forward in "democratic America.' ' But this isn't all. Not only do the states discriminate against the Negroes, but the local counties cut further into Negro school appropria-tions. Thus in 1933, 120 of the 159 counties in Georgia diverted \$1,150,000 from Negro schools to other purposes. It is such crooked political deal-

ing which led to 230 southern counties in which there are 158,939 col ored boys of high school age, having only 1 colored high school! Nor have Federal appropriations been any better. In the 1935-1939

period, Negroes in 17 Southern states, comprising 23% of the population, got only 14% of Federal aid to education. But not only are the funds received by Negro schools less than in

white schools; their needs are much greater. Negro schools are often housed in dilapidated shacks. Thus, the value of the school plant for each southern white student is \$157 while that for each Negro student is \$37.

It is obvious that in Southern agricultural districts, adequate transportation for students is almost as necessary as adequate educational facilities. Yet in all the southern states, despite the fact that the Negro youth are one-third of the population they received only 2% of the total funds allotted for transportation to schools!

The picture is a grim, depressing one. Negro youth, through no fault of their, deprived of a chance to get even an elementary education, doomed to ignorance by a social system which dreads the consequences of giving its slaves (in fact, if not in name) a little knowledge. Next time you hear a pot-bellied politician bellowing about democracy, remind him of these facts.
