Roosovelt's speech at Kingston, Ont., on August 18, which was an extension of the Monroe Doctrine to Canada, was a warning to the world that econon hally Canada belongs to the United States, was another step in the war preparations of American imperialism in its drive toward Asia. Roosevelt pointed out that all nations in the western Hemisphere would join in resisting agression from without. Not growth, but decay, degeneration, and crisis is the main character of world capitalism today.

The present depression is really a continuation, after a brief upturn, of the downward trend of the 1929-33 crisis.

The depression, sweeping out from the U. S., is striking at the world market with hammer blows, and once again destroying

the painstaking efforts of the other bourgeoisies to rebuild their rotten national structures. The collapse of the world market reacts back and deepens still further the crisis in American economy, underlying and pointing the way more and more insistently to the only bosses' "solution" - WAR.

The superior economic strength of American imperialism enables her to withstand the decay to a greater extent than economically weaker nations such as Germany, Italy and Japan, which have had to resort to fascism, dictatorship and colonial invasions to suppress and hold in check the workers and peasants. Similarly, in South America, the pressure of decay has carried with it a series of dictator-

CLASS STRUGGLE SHARPENING

The bourgeoisie seeks to unload the burden of the crisis upon the shoulders of the workers and farmers and lower middle classes, and upon the oppressed colonial masses. The permanent army of the unemployed has grown to 12 millions. The boss class takes advantage of the crisis to launch an offensive to cut wages, increase speed-up, and force down still further the iving conditions of the working class. It uses the unemployed and WPA to cut the employed workers and to keep as much as possible of the diminishing profits for itself.

The bitterness of the crisis, the misery and hunger of the system is awakening the workers to their own class needs and interests. Their awakening to full class consciousness, long delayed in coming, will explode with all the greater force when it

FIGHT FOR NEEDS

Adequate social insurance and cash relief, the 6 hour day 30 hour week with no reduction in pay, trade union pay these are some of the immediate demands of the working class. But rotting capitalism, grasping for profits, clamps down harder and harder against these and the other immediate demands. In the process of fighting for them the workers will realize that even these demands can be achieved only in the struggle against capitalism itself.

Corson is a former Fieldite and an active mass worker. Since these comrades joined, another Revolt member has also applied for membership to the RWL.

AUTO WORKERS MUST TAKE **OVER UNION**

Detroit - With the Stalinist-Frankensteen bloc trying to organize a special convention to oust Martin from the Presidency, the split in the United Automobile Workers of America is wide open. Vice Presidents Frankensteen, a reactionary former Coughlinite, Mortimer, a stalinist, and Ed Hall, whose strike-breaking record stinks to high heavens (he was Dillon's man in leading scabs through a militant IWW picket line a few years ago), have been expelled from the UAW by Martin; and Walter Wells, a mediocre person who rose to his position by an accidental control of 4 votes at the first convention, had been suspended.

Behind these men stands a good section of the Union. Martin's burocratic tactics, his fundamental agreement with these people in POLICY (Frankensteen was his good man Friday until recently), have all helped consolidate the Frankensteen-Statinist

McCORD WORKERS STRIKE

While both cliques are fighting, the bosses are beginning to take steps against the workers. Workers of the McCord Radiator Company are striking against the removal of equipment to other cities where labor is cheaper.

Shifting of work to other cities is now becoming commonplace in Detroit. The UAW cliques have never put up any fight against it; in fact neither the Martin nor Stalinist clique have ever really made an attempt to stop wage differentials. While workers in Dertoit plants in the fibre section of the industry, for instance, were making 75c minimum pay per hour, the same work was being put out, under a similar contract with the UAW, 55 miles away in Toledo, for minimum of 40c an hour.

With the split in the union now the McCord strike is only an indication of what is to come when General Motors, Chrysler and Ford get into action against the Union in the very near future.

THE "NEUTRAL" CAMP

A small group of socialists formerly under Stalinist fluenced mainly around the Reuther boys, and Briggs local, around Emil Mazey, are holding aloof from both cliques. But their record in the past has been one of support (although Mazey usually had a few left critisisms) to the Stalinist group. What is needed today is a rank and file movement for a class struggle policy (against the General Motcapitulations, sell-outs like militant action against wage cuts and decentralization), and for democracy in the union based on this policy.
