Nine years of crisis has beaten down the living standards of the American worker and farmer and is reducing the working
class to the status of European labor. Under the poverty, sordidness and overcrowding of home life, the family is unable hold together. Youth by the tens of housands are on the road. Crime waves in which the youth figure in a tremendous proportion, reflect the hopelessness and disillusionment. Driven by the lash of tarvation to relief and WPA, the unmployed workers are subjected to the demoralizing and spirit-breaking effects of this miserable dole. Upon the negro the crisis has come down with special severity driving him out of job, home, and practi-

## NO "FINAL" CRISIS

## While capitalism on world scale has

 entered its downward curve, that does not mean that this is the "final" crisis of in this general downward trend different countries and different industries witha country will experience brief spurt ahead. But the upturns will be short and weak, the depressions increasingly more protracted and severe. Not growth, but decay, degeneration, and crisis is the main character of world capitalism todayThe present depression is really a continuation, after a brief upturn, of the downward trend of the 1929-33 crisis
The depression, sweeping out from the hammer blows,
the painstaking efforts of the other bour-
geoisies to rebuild their rotten national structures. The collapse of the w o r l d market reacts back and deepens still further the crisis in American economy, underlying and pointing the way more and more insistently to the only bosses' "solution" - WAR.
The superior economic strength of American imperialism enables her to withstand the decay to a greater extent than economically weaker nations such as Germany, Italy and Japan, which have had to resort to fascism, dictatorship and colonial invasions to suppress and hold in check the workers and peasants. Similarly, in South America, the pressure of decay has carried with it a series of dictator hips.

## CLASS STRUGGLE SHARPENING

The bourgeoisie seeks to unload the hurden of the crisis upon the shoulders of classes, and upon the oppressed colonial masses. The permanent army of the unmasses. 12 millions. Vice Presidents Frankensteen, a reactionary former Coughlinite, Mortimer, a stalinist, and Ed Hall, whose strike-breaking re cord stinks to high heavens (he was Dillon's man in leading scabs through a militant IWW picket line a few years ago), have been expelled from the UAW by Martin; and Walter Wells, a mediocre person who rose to his position es at the first convention, ha been suspended.

Behind these men stands good section of the Union. Mar tin's burocratic tactics, his fundamental agreement with these people in POLICY (Frankensteen was his good man Friday until recently), have all heiped consolforce.
McCORD WORKERS STRIKE
While both cliques are fighting, the bosses are beginning to take steps against the workers. Work ers of the McCord Radiator Company are striking against the removal of equipment to other cit ies where labor is cheaper.
Shifting of work to other cities is now becoming commonplace in Detroit. The UAW cliques have never put up any fight against it; Stalinist clique have ever really made an attempt to stop wage differentials. While workers in differentials. While workers in
Dertoit plants in the fibre section of the industry, for instance, were making 75 c minimum pay per hour, the same work was being put out, under a similar contract with the UAW, 55 miles away in Toled
