Shall We Conquer by Love, or Through the Class Struggle?

"You can't catch flies with vinegar," says the advocate of sentimental proparanda to the scientific Socialist. "You must teach men to love one another, not set class against class. You must appeal to the nobler instincts of man.

To this argument we answer: "We are not trying to catch any files. The sentimentalists' simile like most similes is lame on one foot. The Socialist propaganda does not wish to entrap men but to awaken their slumbering manhood and self assertion. In appealing to workingmen as a distinct and separate class in capitalist society, we are appealing to the noblest instinct of man, to the instinct of freedom. It is not the Socialists who set man against man, but the economic conditions. Only by making the working class aware of the fact that the capitalist system is founded on the antagonism of man against man can we bring them to organize as a class and abolish class antagonisms by doing away with their cause, the capitalist system.

"But you can't get along without higher sentiment." wails the mush-and-

This answer evades the point of issue entirely. The scientific Socialist is accented by the same high ideals and by the same altruistic motives as the sentimentalist. But we have learned in the school of bitter experience that sentiment without a scientific basis leads into the morass of defeat. And we have over two thousand years of christian history to prove that sentimental appeals to the sense of brotherhood do not avail against the force of economic conditions. The history of the christian church itself is written in blood, and its message of brotherhood has been powerless to rescue its very teachers from the clutches of capitalist class influence. The class struggle is raging as flercely among the christian "brethren" as among the unchristian elements of society.

The class struggle is an ethical struggle in its very essence. It drives the working class into the libraries to bring to light, by individual effort and development, the facts which the capitalist class strives to conceal from them It makes scholars out of the untutored. It makes brave men out of weaklings. It builds up their self-respect and their character as nothing else will and can do. And in forcing the American working class to defend their class interests against the oppressive power of the capitalist class, it defends, through the working class, the American liberties and ideals against the encroachments of an ever more overbearing plutocracy. We cannot love capitalism out of existence. Neither can we love the work-

ing class into political power. The capitalists as a class have never shown themselves susceptible to the principles of love which their hired teachers are trying to instill into the working class under the pretense of "ennobling The whole spirit and training of capitalist profit mongering gives the lie daily to their story of love. Do not blame us, then, for rejecting a principle in which you capitalists yourselves do not believe and which you have never practiced in your commercial relations with men.

We want the brotherhood of man. We cherish the message of love which the carpenter of Nazareth has given to mankind. But his own experience as that of the oppressed classes of all nations stands as a warning exthe Socialist movement of the world has learned to heed.

Silver dollars are legal tender to sifty amount, but smaller coins are legal tender to amount of \$\tilde{v}\$ or less. Silver co-tificates are NOT legal tender, but as they are exchangeable for silver dollars, which are, they pass for face value and have the same standing in commerce as gold certificates which are not legal ten-der. A "national" bank can buy \$50,000 in bends and deposit them with the U.S. treasurer and receive \$50,000 in bank notes, and still draw interest on the bonds. It cannot withdraw the bonds without returning an equal amount of notes or legal money. You can get a copy of the law by making the request of the Treasury Department, Washington, D. C. I have not seen a structment of the national debt for a long time. It was formerly sent out to the press every month, but since the country began to operate on the Impedial strinciple, the reports have been suppressed as the public might get onto the effects.
