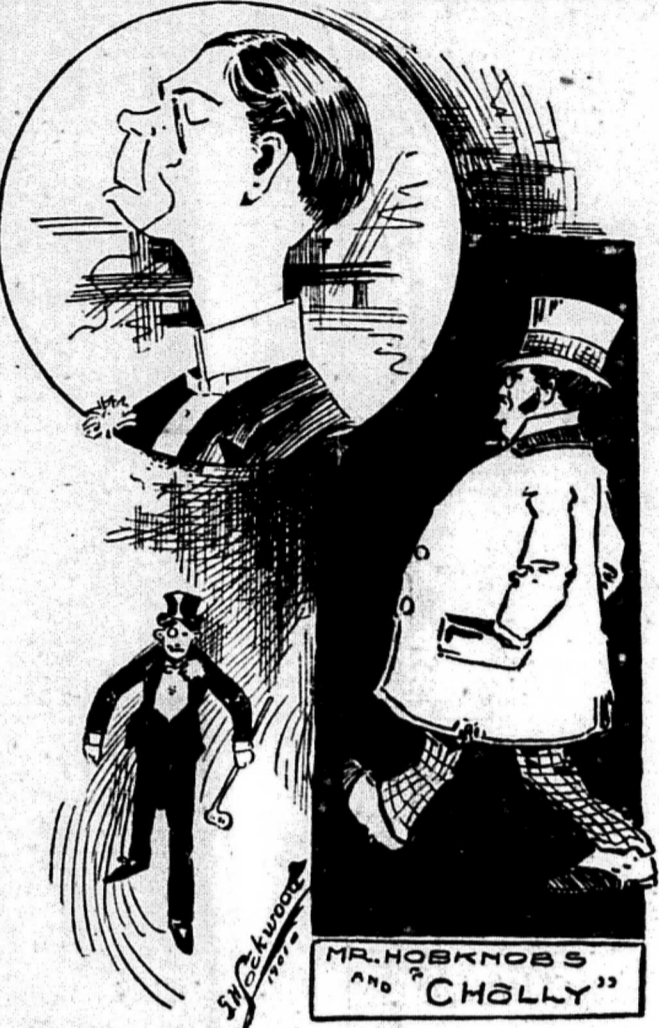
The people are going to have their way, eh? What way? Don't they have their way now? Don't the men they select make the laws?
