Mr. Bone on the Job

Mr. Bone, very much chagrined over the outcome of his attempt to besmirch the characters of the APPEAL editors and their attorney, is meditating revenge. Reports from the inside indicate that Harry is plotting a brand new charge against the APPEAL. We are fully informed of the next move that is to be made, but we are not in a position to make public this knowledge, for the reason that the good friend in the enemy's ranks who furnished us with the information, would be compromised and embarrassed.

Profiting by his experience in the disastrous, to him, contempt proceedings, the district attorney will try again, using different tactics. He is in constant communication with the attorney general of the United States, George W. Wickersham, who is personally directing the fight against the APPEAL. It is said that Wickersham was very angry when he learned of the outcome of the contempt proceedings at Fort Scott and that he took Bone sharply to task for the humiliating defeat.

The APPEAL does not minimize the importance of this new move—nor are we flattering ourselves that we will win as easily as we have in the past. Desperate men, like Bone and his associates, when possessed of absolute power, will stop at nothing to gain their ends. The disgraceful spectacle of the government's witness in the contempt proceedings illustrates what unscrupulous men can and will do. Several employes of the APPEAL have lately been approached by government agents and flattery and threats used in an effort to persuade them to make false statements about this paper and its business. The APPEAL has nothing to conceal. Our office is at all times open to visitors and representatives of the government. The work of the APPEAL is carried on by a force of more than one hundred men and women. It would be absurd for the APPEAL to knowingly do anything that could be construed into a violation of the laws of the land. We, therefore, have nothing to fear from anything that may be said by any man or woman employed in this office. I am quite well aware that two employes of the APPEAL are at this time in communication with Harry Bone's office, but they need make no secret of their intrigue. The APPEAL is onto their little game. When the government and its tratorous allies in the APPEAL office show their hand, the APPEAL will have something to say. In the meantime we are getting ready to play our part in the greatest campaign in the political history of this country.

THE FIRST CHARTER.

The first local organized after the unity convention held in Indianapolis twelve years ago was Local Girard. As I remember, there were ten charter members including the "One Hoss," J. A. Wayland, the irrepressible M. V. Tubbs, E. N. Richardson, W. W. Bush, myself and several others whose names I have forgotten. The original charter occupied a place of state in the APPEAL office for years, but disappeared some time ago and has not since been found. What a marvelous change since that little meeting in Girard twelve years ago! With what hopes we faced the world! Our enthusiasm was unbounded—and best of all, it has not diminished with the passing years. Our confidence in the triumph of Socialism is greater this blessed minute than it was twelve years ago. While we talked loudly and boldly of what we expected to do and boasted of the speedy conquest of capitalism, there was nevertheless a secret thought that our courage was the direct outgrowth of that exuberance of joy that comes to the pioneer. Today it is different. There are now a million Socialist voters and 150,000 members of the party. Our press has grown beyond our wildest imaginings. The APPEAL no longer fights alone. From a circulation of 50,000 it has leaped past the half million mark. The APPEAL Army in those days numbered less than 5,000. Today the APPEAL Army is nearly 100,000 strong. More than 200 vigorous and aggressive Socialist newspapers are sapping at the foundations of capitalism. In every state in the union the work of the social revolution is being pushed forward by this new Army of crusaders.

Perhaps the most remarkable change that has taken place during these twelve years is the change on the political field. Today the old parties have disappeared. The aggressive, confident, domineering republican party of Hanna, Aldrich and Quay has passed from the stage. The party that had but to announce its campaign slogan to arouse the hypnotized millions to election day activity has passed into history. The party of Lincoln has degenerated into a disgraceful scramble for the presidential chair, accompanied by mud-slinging that would shame a bellicose fish monger. The democratic party impotently awaits the action of the republican party before announcing its campaign issues. Standing for no political principle save pelf the leaders of the democratic party merely hope to swing into power because of the split in republican ranks. It reminds one of the child's game of "pussy wants a corner."

The Socialist party alone sounds a true note. With its clarion call ringing loud and clear it points the way that leads to working class emancipation.

THE Kansas City *Star* concludes that if Debs had a little more hair he would look like the late Bill Nye. The country has had so much experience lately with gentlemen wearing mustaches it is seeking someone with a little less hair.

THE colleges of the land will soon turn out a hundred thousand graduates. The better informed of them will all have a Socialist leaning, and will go forth to add to the agitation. Colleges that are of any value do not produce standpatters.

INASMUCH as San Diego complains of workers going to that city to engage in the free speech fight, suppose you keep your dollars from going to California, anywhere, until Governor Johnson guarantees them their constitutional rights.

CHARTERS, licenses and franchises are merely grants of pirategamy made by the government, authorizing the robbery of the people that are behind the government. They are criminal in nature, and, being so, are illegal, and may lawfully be cancelled at any time. If they were so cancelled, then water would disappear from stocks immediately, and the strength of the trust would be broken. If several state platforms were to make a declaration to this effect, it would throw a scare into the ranks of the pirates and give the people greater hope than they ever had before.

A GREAT PLATFORM.

The platform adopted at Indianapolis is the greatest ever written by a Socialist party in any land. This means it is the greatest ever promulgated by any party in any land.

To say this is not declaring that former platforms were not true to the ideals of Socialism, and greater than anything presented by other parties up to this time. Workers are human, and it is to be expected that they shall become more clear in statement, more practical in demand, more dignified and statesmanlike in their methods. The fact that they can do this argues that they are preparing themselves for the right use of power when it shall come to them.

In the Indianapolis platform there is a presentation of conditions in America, rather than an abstract essay such as appeared in some former efforts. Its declarations on socialization are explicit and many, yet there is no effort to slip over and attend to the knitting of some other nation. The demands are such that they indicate how socialization may be brought about, and how the workers may immediately become masters of the situation. It is more of a national platform and less of a mere trades union declaration than any previous platform has been. Yet its absolute loyalty to the working class is unquestionable.

It gives the farmer a place in the national presentation of issues he never had before. It has a declaration on money, as former platforms had not. It ignores all that is foreign to it—such as explaining that Socialism is not opposed to religion, wisely displaying that dignity which tells its purposes in positive terms and refusing to be placed on the defensive.

Perhaps this is not the best Socialist platform that will ever be written; Socialists are growing as the movement grows and ought to improve on it; but it is worthy the closest attention from the American people, and should within itself be worth a half million votes to the Socialist party.

SOME of our friends seem to misunderstand the APPEAL'S proposal to give its entire front page to Father Vaughan, the celebrated priest, of New York city, who holds a commission from the Pope to stem the rising tide of Socialism in the United States.

The offer is not confined to Father Vaughan alone, and if for any reason he does not accept, the space will be turned over to any dignitary of the catholic church, designated by Cardinal Gibbons. This action does not mean that the APPEAL has deserted the Socialist colors! The offer is made to prove our faith in the principles of Socialism. We have no fear of the outcome of an intelligent discussion, and for that reason we are willing, yea anxious, to carry to our readers the strongest arguments our opponents can produce. If Father Vaughan accepts our offer, which I sincerely hope he will do, both sides of the question will be presented for the consideration of Socialists and non-Socialists alike.

My experience in propaganda work convinces me that many persons may be interested in anti-Socialist articles who otherwise could not be induced to read anything on the subject, and we all agree that it is better to have people read anti-Socialist articles than to read nothing about Socialism at all. CORNERING COFFEE.

The people, with all they imagine they know about the trusts, are still in blissful ignorance of their most pernicious inside operations. The house committee of congress, investigating the "money trust," has come upon a coffee trust, the magnitude of which can scarcely be described. According to the testimony of Herman Seicken, a large dealer in green coffee, the big capitalists of three governments have conspired to reduce the coffee crop in Brazil and to hold millions of bags in storage for the beneficent purpose of keeping up the prices. The three countries involved in this coffee conspiracy are Germany, France and the United States, and the scheme was financed by the Morgan and Rockefeller banks in New York for the American capitalists, and the loan made to float this "valorization scheme," so-called, amounted to \$46,000,000.

ONE HOSS PHILOSOPHY

THROUGH the pressure of organized labor, New Zealand state owned railroads carry school children 120 miles for from three to six cents, where they attend high schools. And the railroads make a profit then. Labor unions are such awful things!

THOSE who manipulate the industries to skin you are certainly not going to work for you in politics. Why should they?

A WORKER makes two things and is given one of them. Interest is what the master charges the worker for the use of the one the worker gave him.

IF others control your life then you are not free. And if others control the land from which you must draw that which sustains life, you are not free.

THE law gives money no debt-paying power except in a few instances. You cannot make a man sell you anything except he wishes to. But if you owe him something the law compels him to take money in settlement of it.

WE are what our environment makes us. We believe the things we do, think the things we think, because they are the products of our environment through life. Had we been raised in a Mohammedan country we would be like them, with all their ideas and customs.

THE great effect of the public schools will be shown during the next twenty years. Our children are not going to be controlled by the superstition and prejudice that has controlled us and our fathers. They will see more clearly as we see more clearly than our forefathers. The boys in the high schools today will make a very different social condition than we have to live in.

OUR ancestors believed many things which even children today know was foolish. And we believe many things that our children will laugh at. Why not get wise to as much as we can in life now? Throw away your prejudice and look at things with good, ordinary horse sense and you will see what is the matter with the condition that makes rich of the idle and poverty of the industrious. You believe in interest, rent and profit as our forefathers believed in witchcraft and kings.

WHEN the populist party came up it fused with the democrats where it could win in that way, and where the republicans controlled the legislatures it made it unlawful for the same names to appear on two tickets; in Wisconsin this law was passed, and now because the Socialist party refuses to fuse, and the old parties want to beat them, the legislature has been called to make a law to permit them to fuse. Which shows the fundamental difference between the populist and the democrats.

WAGES AND PROSTITUTION.

The legislature of Massachusetts some time ago created a wage commission for the purpose of reporting a minimum wage in certain industries in that state. This commission, after laborious investigation, has submitted a report which contains food for serious thought. Among other things it is here reported that 60 per cent of the women employees in retail stores in that state receive less than eight dollars per week. Of the women who work in cotton mills 67 per cent receive less than eight dollars per week. It is also found that 41 per cent of the candy workers, 10 per cent of the laundry workers and 25 per cent of the cotton workers receive less than five dollars per week.

We are not going to comment on these figures. They speak most pathetically for themselves. In these days of high cost of living thousands of women and girls who are driven by poverty into the industrial scramble are compelled to face the problem, the tragic problem, of preserving their womanhood at a wage of less than five dollars per week. To what extent failure marks their efforts is evident all about us if we have eyes to see the results, the appalling results of capitalist production.

THEY are getting good now. An anti-injunction bill has passed the house by a good majority. It will be useful to the men running for congress to read to their constituents during the coming campaign, and after November the supreme court can knock it out just as easy.

LAST year the government one per cent tax on corporation earnings was in round figures \$31,000,000. This means that the people paid the corporations over three billion dollars, and they "divided" with the government to get the privilege of robbery. The total averages for each family, \$145.

CAPITALISM lives by robbing the workers, and is enabled to rob them because it tricks and deceives them.

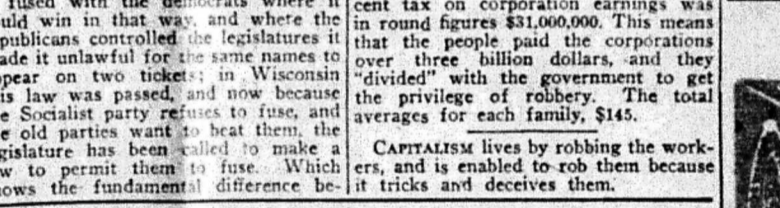

Real Enthusiasm

THERE is no moral quality so essential to a successful campaign as enthusiasm. Of course, we do not mean the artificial brand so common among the paid claqueurs of the capitalist parties. We hold in loathing the cheap and vulgar artifices of the capitalist parties to excite seeming enthusiasm among their dupes so as to make it appear that the candidates they are shouting for are popular with the people. We mean the kind of enthusiasm that springs spontaneously from the hearts of men and women who are devoted to a great cause and who are fighting fearlessly for their principles. This kind of enthusiasm is not generated in gin mills, nor in the fifty political quarters of ward-heeling skates. They do not know and they never can know the moral exultation of the genuine enthusiasm inspired in the breasts of those who against great odds are fighting nobly to make this a better world.

We venture to say that no movement ever organized among men has created a more widespread and wholesome enthusiasm than the international Socialist movement. Its noble principles, its high and humane aspirations, and its clean and elevating methods of education and appeal, go straight to the hearts of men and women and children, and in rallying to its splendid standard they feel the blood within their veins tingling with new life and their hearts throbbing with an enthusiasm that knows no bounds.

We now stand on the edge of the greatest political campaign in American history and the enthusiasm at our conventions and at all our meetings cannot be described in words. Our comrades now feel that after all these years that at last have a great national party that spreads over all the states of the union and that challenges the upholders of capitalism to show reason why the people should any longer give their support, political or otherwise, to a system which has brought such conditions as now exist upon the country.

The few great trusts and corporations that now rule with a despotism more odious than that of foreign monarchies have the people at their mercy in this system, and there is no hope for the nation's toilers outside of the Socialist movement, the movement of the enslaved masses who are now being marshaled on the economic and the political field to wage the struggle relentlessly until capitalism is overthrown and the people are free.

It is not surprising that in such a struggle with the future of all human-kind at stake, the Socialists are aflame with an enthusiasm that will never abate until their cause is triumphant.

SUGAR, TWO CENTS A POUND.

W. L. Bass, an American who produces sugar in San Domingo, testified before the senate committee, that refined sugar pays a magnificent profit at less than two cents a pound, and but for the tariff would be selling in this country for two cents. And yet you fellows will vote for parties this fall that make you pay six cents a pound! You don't seem to have sense enough to tell the difference between two cents and six cents. Socialism would give the people sugar at what is paid the workers for producing it—that is, you would get about seventy-five pounds of sugar for \$1. Capitalists tell you that Socialism would injure you. It would keep them from making a profit off you, and that is why they are opposed to it. Write your congressman and senators for a report on the sugar testimony given by William Lewis Bass, and show it to your blind neighbors.

If Colonel Roosevelt should be nominated and elected president, where do you suppose he will stand in presidential primaries four years from now?

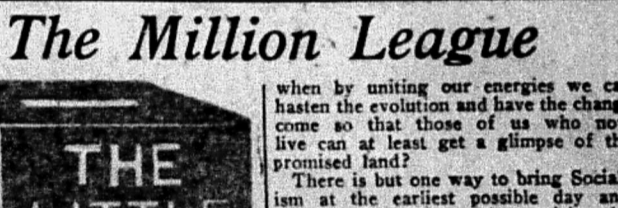

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Cuba is Invaded—Annexation to Follow—War We People Know

The masters have stolen a march on the workers. While protest has been made against intervention in Mexico to such an extent that the executive was afraid to order invasion, the same capitalist interests that are behind the maneuvering in and around that country have succeeded in fomenting a revolution in Cuba and getting American intervention there. The papers hide this, the biggest news of the day, in obscure corners, but it means annexation of that island in behalf of the sugar trust, a Morgan-controlled property. That much is indicated by the press reports. Listen:

Washington, May 25.—As a result of reports that danger to American lives and property in Cuba the navy department has ordered five hundred marines to the naval station at Guantanamo.

State department advice today regarding Cuba were very pessimistic. Apparently the government has been unable to estimate the strength or purpose of the present insurrectionary movement. The Cuban military authorities admit the situation is serious but believe they can control it.

It is reliably reported to the state department that many people consider the movement designed to provoke intervention. It is a serious matter of discussion for some time among the diplomatic corps here, that the Cuban government itself might be forced to charge the entire policy of the country to the capitalists.

That is the Associated Press dispatch in full. "The United Press says it no doubt means annexation of the island. A war of conquest has been forced on the people, and because it is an infant defending its life and no great stir need be raised, the importance of the move that changes the entire policy of the country is belied by the capitalist press. Let the people awaken to the meaning of it and protest. When the Spanish-American war, precipitated by the criminal blowing up of the Maine in order to force America to "expand" its territory, was about to be fought, the American congress, by resolution, solemnly promised that Cuba should not be annexed. Now this promise to the world is to be violated while no one is looking. It is time you were looking.

Where, also, where, oh, where, is the fool workman that joined the militia and the regular army in order to protect property and preserve life? Will this incident be sharp enough to penetrate his head with the idea that armies are not for the protection of the lives of workmen, and that workmen have no property for which they need an army?
