When he returned from Africa he was immediately met by a letter from an APPEAL reader, asking about it, and he wrote the Outlook, the publication of which he is associate editor, which letter appeared in the Outlook for May, 1909:

"When I became governor various proposed bills were laid before me permitting savings banks to invest in different kinds of securities. I answered that I would not accept my own or another private individual's judgment in such a matter and that I should request in each case the endorsement of the saving bank and of the regular officials thereof.

LaFollette Doubts Roosevelt

SENATOR LA FOLLETTE, of Wisconsin, has demonstrated that he is a real progressive. He has actually fought along those lines for many years, exhausting himself physically and financially in order to forward the ideas.

"The Roosevelt administration came to a close on the fourth of March, 1909, without leaving to its credit a definite progressive national movement with a clearly defined body of issues.

On the twenty-fourth of March, 1909, Roosevelt sailed for Africa. He was absent from the country until June, 1911. In that period, under the administration of President Taft, the progressive republican movement made greater headway than during the entire Roosevelt administration.

It is made under the provision of the Aldrich-Vreeland currency bill, which was signed by Theodore Roosevelt when he was president, and which he commended as "a wholesome progressive law."

It simply means that they can issue stocks and bonds for reconstructing the transportation and manufacturing system of America, and cash out to the government, so that the people will pay for them and then they will own them.

There never was such a stupendous steal undertaken in the history of the world as that which is going to go through, whether Roosevelt, Taft or Wilson is elected. The fact is, that steal is under way now.

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Though he had sworn to being a resident of Washington, in order to escape paying taxes in New York, he now aspired to the governorship of that state.

One Hero's Gentle Greatness. AH, the rare courtesy, tact, kindness and gentleness of soul of this unsung champion of right!

Roosevelt As Governor. His governorship was marked by two or three peculiar incidents. After all the hot-air blasts against the "canal thieves" which he used for grandstand oratory, before election, not one was prosecuted.

His administration of the office of insurance commissioner had been notoriously scandalous, but permitted him to go un-

scathed, and let Platt name his successor.

One characteristic touch was his message to the people of New York, congratulating them on carrying to a successful conclusion "one of the most righteous wars of modern times."

There was no one whose reign had looked on such a spectacle. Crosby S. Noyes, editor of the Washington Star (a republican paper, supporting T. R.), in an address before the National Editorial association, June 13, 1907, said:

"The nation went wild! All the bands played, the spot lights hissed and sizzled, everybody yelled, high heaven itself trembled, and Theodore Roosevelt was nominated by acclaim! Nominated and elected to next to the highest office in the nation's gift."

Hardly out of office, he plunged into the jungles of Africa, and there shocked and horrified all the world which still can feel, by his unlimited wading in the blood of beasts no whit more ferocious than himself. 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Biggest Steal in History. TWO years ago the APPEAL exposed in detail the absorption of the Tennessee Coal and Iron company by the steel trust, with the consent of Theodore Roosevelt, in violation of law, under the caption of "Greatest Steal in History."

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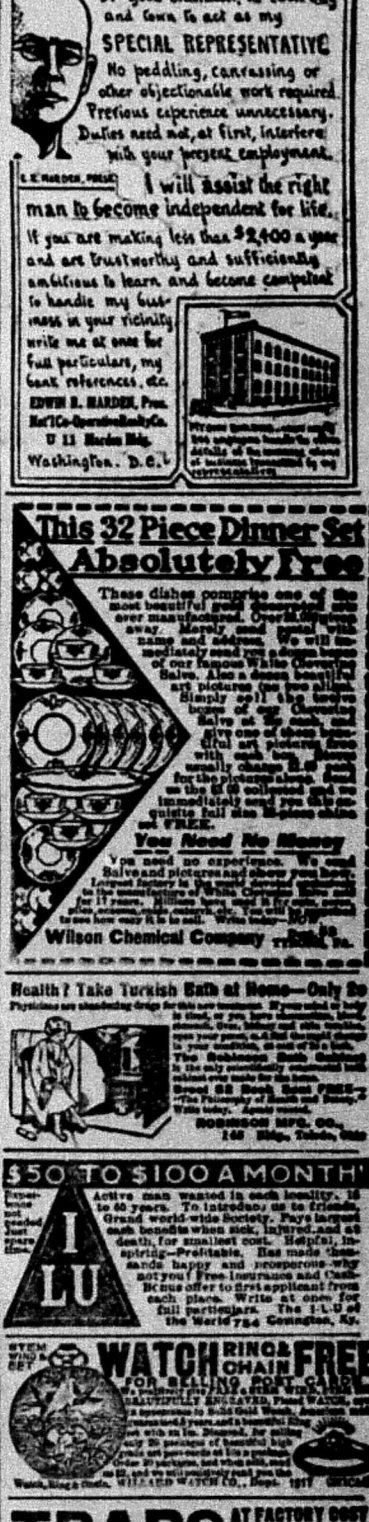

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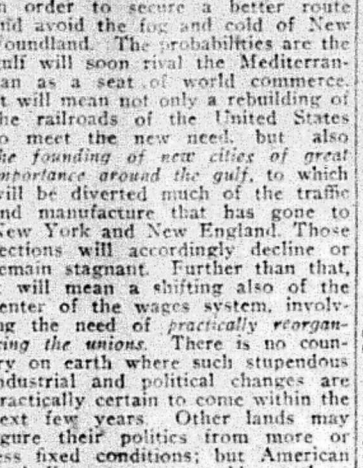

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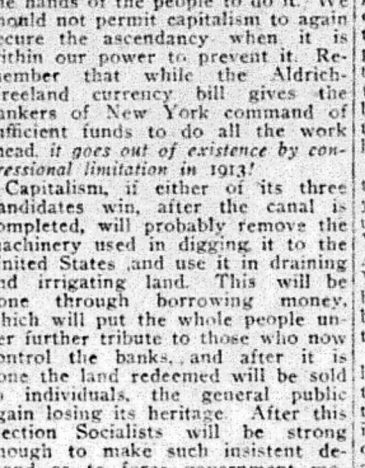

As a rule the poor man when he goes to court has everyone arrayed against him—the judge on the bench, the lawyers on both sides are people who have no sympathy for him or his cause.

It is very essential that the workers of America arouse to the practical possibilities of the immediate future.

THE DIFFERENCE. The republican party stands for things as they are; it wants no change. The democratic party stands for 'honesty' on a platform made up of stolen planks.

HEREIN comes the opportunity for Socialism. If I did not see the stupendous opportunity ahead, which I fear all Socialists may not be clear sighted enough to grasp.
