He is a red-hot democratic politician, and in addition to his various banking and railroad enterprises is the financial backer of Father Pomenevy, the Kansas priest who has been on the trail of the Appeal for seven years.

When the news of the tragic death of our comrade, J. A. Wayland, was flashed across the country, there was great rejoicing in Camp Plutocracy. With ghoulish glee they announced that "the zenith of the Appeal had been reached, and that the death of Wayland paved the way for its end."

I shall not deny that for a brief period following the memorable Sunday night, November 10, that it appeared as though the very world itself had suddenly ceased to exist. As I look back over those days of stress and trial, I wonder from whence came the strength to bear the burdens that were placed upon those of us here in Girard. I know now. The strength came flashing along those invisible wires that connect the Appeal with the Appeal Army. Then came your telegrams. And then the deluge of letters!

The Appeal is not dead—because the Appeal Army is back of it. The kindly face of our loved comrade, has passed away. But the thought he set in motion can never die. The Appeal will continue on its way growing in influence and circulation. It will grow because there is a need, a crying need, for a paper that speaks in clarion tones for the working class. All theimps of this capitalist hell, backed by all the millions at the com-

mand of Bird S. Coler and General Otis and their allies cannot prevail against the Appeal Army. Before you can kill the Appeal you must disperse its Army of loyal supporters. This you know. Now let us make the other fellow know that, too. That is the object of the Big Issue in January—The Appeal's Indictment of Harry Bone. This land should revert to the public domain. Otis' gang has exploited it long enough.

THE National Business league of America is sending out to city commercial clubs copies of the platform recently adopted. The platform among other things declares that the closed shop is un-American. It also says: "Any attempt to disturb the functions of courts or to attack legislators is treason. The courts must not be intimidated. Every man is free born and has the God-given right, guaranteed to him by the constitution of the United States, of honest employment." Dear me! The righteous business men of America are not pleased with labor unions! They declare every man has a right to employment. But the right doesn't amount to much when hundreds of thousands of workmen are out of a job today.

"CRUSHING THE WEAK."

Woodrow Wilson, president elect, has an article in the current issue of *World's Work* in which he says:

American industry is not free as once it was. American enterprise is not free; the man with only a little capital is finding it harder to compete with the big man, and more impossible to compete with the big fellow. Why? Because the laws of this country do not prevent the strong from crushing the weak. The strong dominate the industrial and economic life of the country.

Mr. Wilson here reflects the political wisdom of the democratic party. According to his logic if "the laws" did not prevent the strong from crushing the weak, the weak would probably crush the strong. Is that his idea? If so, he should have said for the benefit of the weak that before this can come to pass the weak will have to become stronger than the strong new era. The strong have always crushed the weak since the beginning of society, and never more so than in the present system.

But Mr. Wilson's chief concern is about the middle-man, the little fellow who cannot successfully compete against a big fellow, and this, we take it from his article, he proposes to remedy by "law." As well might he try by law to prevent big fish from swallowing little ones.

The crushing business is simply incidental to and inseparable from "free competition," of which Mr. Wilson and the democratic party are the boasted champions. The free competition the speedier the destruction of the little fellows Mr. Wilson weeps over and is trying to save.

What possible good would the saving of the little fellows do, even if it were possible? Is the world's industry in the future to be controlled by little fellows? We have passed through the "little fellows" stage of industrial and economic development and Mr. Wilson will sigh in vain for its return. The "little fellows" are making their last stand against "big interests" and just what these little fellows amount to, even under the administration of Mr. Wilson, their friend and champion, will become apparent enough before the new administration is six months old and it comes to pass, as it inevitably will, that the big fellows are even Mr. Wilson's masters and that his administration will be dominated absolutely by them in spite of the outcries of the little fellows who look to Mr. Wilson to save them from their fate.

The little fellows are all in favor of "free competition," but when they are frozen out at their own game they squeal like rats for a new deal.

Socialists will observe with mingled amusement and pity the antics of Mr. Wilson and his democratic administration when they come to saving the little fellows from being put out of business by the big fellows.

A MAIL carrier employed at the postoffice of Los Angeles, Cal., reports that a big majority of the postoffice employees are Socialists. Postmaster Harrison has declared that fully 90 per cent of his employees are Socialists. The carrier adds that he and his fellow postmen are doubly careful to see that Appeals reach their destination. How's that for loyalty? And right in Otis' own city, too.

THE average annual cost of the army and navy for the eight years preceding the Spanish war was \$31,500,000; for the eight years since that war it has been \$183,400,000, or an average yearly increase in the latter period of \$134,000,000, making a total increase in eight years of \$1,072,000,000 or 350 per cent. It costs more every year. And yet we wonder at the high cost of living.

ACCORDING to dispatches from Paris the people of that city are alarmed because women do not follow her silly fashions as they once did. Think of the audacity of women daring to dress as they please instead of as the profit mongers say they should dress.

A Capitalistic Problem

Announcement is made that the total number of bonds held by United States banks reaches \$5,333,000,000. The interest on these bonds at 5 per cent amounts to more than \$250,000,000 annually. It is an indebtedness that was piled on you without your agreement and you are bonded to pay it. It is a manacle just as surely as the iron collar that used to be fastened around the necks of the serfs was a bond.

But that isn't all. Under the provisions of the Aldrich-Vreeland currency bill these bonds become available for deposit with the government and the issuance of currency to the banks up to 90 per cent of their value. This means that the banks can collect 5 per cent interest on the bonds, pay 2 per cent to the government, and get back over four billion of money besides as a free gift.

With this money they will be able to buy up all the property in the nation. It is not the normal work of even the profit system. It is simply a stupendous steal by which the many are now enslaved and are being further enslaved.

The Los Angeles Times contains an advertisement of a bank in that city which says: "You are an investment to your boss if you work on a salary. He pays you for your labor and your labor pays him handsome dividends. You don't get all you earn, probably only half of it, and you can't as long as you are on the pay list." And then it advises you to get off the pay list by saving and depositing your wages in its vaults. How delightful—for the banks!

The masters admit they are growing rich by exploiting your labor, while you grow poor on starvation wages. Haven't you thought there might be something in this yourself?

...The A B C of It...

ANARCHY is a capitalistic condition, not a theory of impossibilities.

BALLOT or bullet, bread or blood. Socialism merely shows the safe and easy way out of the horrors of the system.

CAPITALISM must have an army of unemployed in order to enable it to keep prices of labor down and insure its profits.

IGNORANCE is the beginning and end of evil. It blinds one eye with prejudice and the other with narrow views. It, however, is the only total blindness that can certainly be cured; and every man may cure his own.

JUSTICE has been the dream of the ages. Men have combined in order to give it power, only to find that the power was used to defeat justice. They say justice is blind; but she can smell gold a mile away.

KINGS rule by divine right just as much as capitalists do. Kings are entitled to their tribute just as much as the landlord and machine lord are entitled to theirs. Kings have as much right to transmit their crowns to others as capitalists have to transmit their fortunes to others.

LIBERTY has always been sought by gaining power so it might be given; but the gaining of power over others means their enslavement. It can come only when we want it so much we will refuse to enslave, when we are so true to truth we shall require it in ourselves.

MANKIND has sought good by taking it from others and leaving them without good; but they found that when any were miserable they, too, must be miserable; that when any lacked, they might sometimes lack themselves. Good

can come only through mutualism, and then it must be for all.

NO man's thought is great enough to be your only thought; yet every man's thought belongs to you if you will take it.

OUT of the past there come two voices, the shout of the victor and the groan of the vanquished. Yet in every age the eye of faith has turned to the stars above this and expected better.

POVERTY is not without cause. If it has a cause it can be cured, so soon as that cause is removed. They who claim it is eternal blame the Almighty with the injustice and misery of it.

QUESTIONS ask themselves or they are of no importance. They who seek issues have not discovered what the issue is and cannot do so. The question of Socialism would ask itself anew if all the Socialists were killed in one day.

RELIGION is not helped any by the misery of the people. Like all the flowers of creation, it will flourish better in the sun than in the night of ignorance and poverty and physical sorrow. Socialism will free it as it will free all things else.

SOCIALISM, after all, is not so much of an ism or philosophy as it is a living thing. It is the breathing of the world of workers after better conditions. It must be interpreted according to the quivering heart of things and not according to theory.

THE want of the world is father of human wants that ask for better things. The poor have endeavored to supply their wants and the rich have taken what the poor created; while with everything the poor produced and lost the feeling of want increased until now it is so strong it cannot be suppressed.

UNITED effort is what produced the family, the church and the state. It is the power behind Socialism. The union of the workers in universal co-operation is the only possible union of men. It cannot be in opinion, but it can be in labor and helpfulness.

VICTOR and victims; Master and slaves. Superabundance and penury. This has been the order of human life. Man, the greatest of creatures, has from his very greatness of desire and power made the most stupendous failure, the most unendurable misery of any that is. He must rise above himself until he shall have reached his true and full altitude.

WHATEVER we may have thought about it, there can be no wealth except commonwealth. All you may individually acquire or save is but spoil and will not protect you from spoliation or misfortune. No man is rich or can be rich until all who live are enriched through possession of what they create even as they are wise through possession of what wisdom of the ages has accumulated.

EMINENT GRAFTERS.

Gilson Gardner, Washington correspondent of the Scripps papers, in a quite recent letter from the capital, says:

Two federal judges, a United States senator and several of the most prominent members of Washington City, including the candidate for chairman of the inaugural committee, are involved in the investigation demanded by Chairman Johnson of the district committee of the house.

The names of the federal judges have been used in promotion literature of the First National Fire Insurance company, which has sold stock in all parts of the country. These judges are George W. Atkinson of the D. C. court of claims, and Ashley M. Gould, justice of the supreme court of the district.

Proceeding to show the state of affairs requiring investigation, Gardner furnishes details of real estate manipulations and dealings with which the same gentlemen and others of their stripe are connected, out of which millions have been made and in which these gentlemen have liberally shared.

Gould, the federal judge here implicated, is the gentleman, it will be remembered, who first criticized the officers of the A. F. of L. from publishing the notice of a boycott against a non-union concern and afterward cited them to appear before him and sentenced them to jail for contempt.

The very suspicion of federal judges being implicated in such grafting enterprises disqualifies them utterly as judges and discredits them completely as men.

"A BURNING, SEETHING HELL." This is what Governor George W. Donaghey, of Arkansas, called the penitentiary of that state under the lease system, and it was for this reason that he issued summary pardons to 316 state convicts.

Governor Donaghey had done all in his power to have the brutal system abolished. Said he: "I have sent message after message to the legislature, only to see a powerful lobby stifle every measure against the selling of flesh and blood to slave-driving contractors for the railroads."

There is much more than this, but we have not space for it in these columns. The governor goes on to show that magistrates before whom prisoners with prison officials and grafting contractors to keep them supplied with convict slaves.

The conditions here described by Governor Donaghey and the brutal outrages inflicted upon helpless prisoners not one whit worse than were those in Leavenworth which the APPEAL exposed and which have in consequence been in some measure corrected.

We ask the reader to pause and consider for just a moment that it is only because the APPEAL called public attention to such crimes against suffering humanity as caused Governor Donaghey to pardon 316 convicts—it is only because the APPEAL tried in its way to put an end to these monstrous evils by calling public attention to them, that its editors are now under indictment and threatened with prison sentences.

Think of this, regardless of your politics, and then tell us candidly if you think this paper and its editors are being prosecuted in the name of justice or persecuted in the name of crime.

The masters are seeking to crush the public school so that they may have more docile slaves. In every great city, though graft is rampant, not enough room is provided to house in the schools more than three-fourths of the workers' children.

PRIVATE monopoly of money is monopoly of everything that money will buy. Money and banking should be public functions exclusively.

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ROOT OF ROBBERY.

Elihu Root of the United States senate from New York, and late chief counsel and defender of the Boss Tweed ring, laments the fact in a recent speech that "hundreds of thousands of people look upon big business men as robbers." It is not without good reason that the people entertain such an opinion of the "captains" of modern industry.

In the case of "big interests" which Root represents, they have been forced to the conclusion by the bitterest kind of experience that pirates are in control of the nation's resources, the nation's industries and commerce and that by processes of robbery which put to shame all the lootings of which history gives account they have practically dispossessed the people and now disport themselves in the most riotous extravagance and luxury ever known.

In making this plea for the robbers Senator Root is in his true role. From the beginning of his public career he has been the apologist and retrainer of the ruling class. He has always been the pampered pet of Wall street and he has never had one honest heart-throb of sympathy with the common people.

It was Thomas Fortune Ryan, whom Bryan sought to have expelled from the democratic party because of his unsavory record as an exploiter, who held up Root as the great ideal lawyer who could tell the plutocrats just what they could do in the way of carrying on their practices within the law and without taking any chances of going to the penitentiary.

Root would have us believe that when Morgan got \$60,000,000 for organizing the robber steel trust it was a perfectly legitimate earning instead of downright wholesale robbery but we are no longer taking our lessons from the retainers of the robbers. We are doing some thinking on our own account.

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Wayland's Life

The real life of Wayland is written in his works "with a leaden pen in the rock forever." The plot and purport of this may never be put into the pages of a book.
