All Unions Join Drive to Free WPA Strikers

The pound, pound, pound of the marching feet of millions of European workers are sounding the knell of the so-called with which the world has been so liberally endowed for the past twenty years. It is the workers who march to their death, not the diplomats who are so busy preparing hell with their carefully worded messages. Perhaps even before this sees the light of the press, the world will be embroiled in the new world war. Those same millions of workers, German, English, Polish, French-will be busy killing one another for the glory of something they can't quite fig-

Meanwhile here in America the fight between the bosses and the workers, between the AFL and the CIO, and now between sister unions within the AFL goes merrily on.

The Green Mountain Boys have won their fight with the Warner Construction Company. Colorado labor has definitely gone a step An agreement between the six AFL unions involved in the strike, and Leroy Warner of the Warner Construction company of Chicago, was signed August 25. It will become effective on September 15. Under the terms the unions agreed that northern Colorado workers should have the first preference in all jobs, and the company agreed that, except in certain categories, all workers would either have to be union members before they would be hired, or they would join within seven days after they were given employment.

Governor Carr, who sent the militia into Green Mountain AFTER the vigilantes wounded seven union said that he would not lift martial law until after the agreement went into ef-fect, and then only when it is proved to him that the agreement "can be enforced."

Seven unionists were shot, one lost an eye and is still suffering om secondary shock, in the "battle" on Green Mountain when the dam-site armed with high powered telescopic rifles which they had exchanged inside the dam for their old fashioned squirrel rifles. The unionists were unarmed.

There isnt much doubt in mind that this agreement WILL be enforced.

The whole upper tier of the jail has been set aside for the exclusive use of the strike prisoners. With the firm conviction of their innocence and the encouraging solidarity of the union movement, the morale of the prisoners, needle to say, is high.

Several concessions, customary in cases of this nature, have been won for the prisoners. For instance, they are permitted to mingle from 7 to 1 a. m., from 1 to 4 p. m., and from 6 to 7:30 p. m. owing the supper hour.

The food, like all prison fare, is usy and those prisoners requiring inless they have the money to buy . But fruit and milk have been given the prisoners. Naturally, imprisonment is not a happy experience, but the strikers expre themselves as sppreciative







A Case of Mistaken Identity

One of the few light moments in the deep tragedy of the unemployed in Minneapolis which resulted in the WPA strike and its aftermath of repression was the accidental slugging of a contemptible fink named Elftman by a cop, Charles J. Marxen. Elftman, a scab on the WPA job at the Trudeau school, was making a general nuisance of himself the morning of July 12th, windmilling his arms around in front of pickets in an attempt to provoke them. Marxen mistook him for a striker and smacked him around, hauled him away in a squad car, charged him with disorderly conduct. Elftman was fined \$25.

Now the federal grand jury, on the testimony of Elftman, has indicted Marxen the cop for "interfering with a WPA worker."

To be sure, Marxen was immediately freed on bail, but even so, the thing has been carried too far. Enough

The federal grand jury was acting in the tradition of American democracy when it never dreamed of indicting the cops who went out of their way to kill and injure the unemployed the night of Bloody Friday. Down with the working class and up with the cops and law and order! That is the slogan of the whole pack of ox-headed boss politicians who are victimizing the WPA strikers, from the president, right through the Attorney General, the U. S. Attorney Anderson, Glotzbach and the rest.

But we demand the freedom of Marxen. The whole affair was obviously a case of mistaken identity.
