Report of the Action of the National Committee on Referendums

MOTIONS 2, 3 AND 4

National Headquarters, Socialist Party, Chicago, Ill., April 11, 1906.
To the National Committee, Socialist Party.
Comrades:—Herewith is submitted report of Referendum No. 2, Motions No. 2 and 3:

By National Committeeman Schwartz of Pennsylvania.

Motion No. 2.

"I move that the National Secretary be instructed to have the resignation of Joseph M. Patterson as Commissioner of Public Works of Chicago, printed in leaflet form, and that same be sold to state committees and locals at cost."

By National Committeeman Zimmerman of West Virginia.

Motion No. 3.

"I move that the National Secretary be and hereby is empowered to pay a sum not to exceed one hundred dollars each month as follows:

- The articles to be clearly Socialist articles.
- They shall exceed 500 words, except in the large dailies or periodicals where transient writers are limited to a less number, then that limitation shall determine the length of the article.
- They must appear in non-Socialist papers or periodicals and be signed by the Comrade or under a nom de plume.
- The articles may be, but need not be entirely, original.
- The Comrade must send a marked copy of the paper containing the article to the National Secretary, together with a statement from the secretary of the local of which he is a member, certifying that he is in good standing and is entitled to consideration.

6. Payments to be made at the rate of \$1.00 for each article, and for the first hundred articles each month, meeting these requirements, but no Comrade shall be paid for more than six articles in any one month.

7. The National Executive Committee shall be the judges and see that these rules are complied with."

Comment.

Simons (Ill.)—"I would suggest that only that portion be printed that is of general interest—that the opening paragraphs dealing with details of Chicago municipal administration connected with his former office be omitted."

Berlyn (Ill.)—"I vote no on Motion 2, for the following reasons: that the subject matter has had full publicity both in the capitalistic and Socialistic press. In itself it is not of a character to educate or interest the working class in the struggles between labor and capital. It would be useless. Leaflets emanating from National office should have some permanent value. I hope that Comrade Patterson will write something that would be good for general propaganda."

Menton (Mich.)—"I vote no on Motion 2, Referendum 2, as I cannot see where the resignation of Patterson to Mayor Dunn would make good propaganda matter, it is not clear enough, and further, I do not believe to slob over anyone who may come from the capitalistic ranks into our movement."

Mills (Texas.)—"I believe a generous distribution of Patterson's letter will do good among a certain class of folks our regular propaganda does not always reach, but I believe that on the same leaflet should be printed as supplementary a brief statement of the Socialistic philosophy and program."

Comment.

Lowry (Ark.)—"I cannot vote for motion as worded. I doubt the wisdom of offering a reward of one dollar for this work. The proposition to use the columns of the daily press and the magazines is a good one, but leave off the reward. I am instructed to vote no."

Krieger (Conn.)—"Record me as voting no on Motion No. 3. I recognize the press as the greatest educational force of the age, and we should do all in our power to get Socialist articles published therein, but I believe that it can and should be done without dollars."

Ufert (N. J.)—"I cannot agree that \$1.00 is a sufficient reward for the writer. Furthermore the National Executive would be burdened with a great amount of work if this were carried out,

and the expense would reach \$200 or even more. Lastly it seems doubtful that all writers would elect to have the National Executive Committee be the bureau of censorship for their articles and for this reason the most able articles would probably never be submitted."

Bentley (Okla.)—"I wish to be recorded as not voting on Referendum No. 2, Motion 3. It's too good an idea to sit down on, and yet I can't vote to pay out money in that way."

Schwartz (Pa.)—"Please record me as voting No on Motion No. 3. My reasons are that there are a number of Comrades now writing Socialist articles which are published in non-Socialist papers without any remuneration from the party. I believe the hundred dollars could be used to better advantage, besides Socialists ought not to be looking for any prizes, but for the cooperative commonwealth."

Comment.

LaRue (Ala.)—"I vote no on Motion No. 4, for the reasons, 1st, I think it impracticable, and will bring no material results. 2nd, As it is presented to the National Committee, it is not a motion, but merely a suggestion, entirely proper for transmission to the party; but not in proper form to be voted upon. I think it an argument or a preaching, rather than a motion."

Berlyn (Ill.)—"I vote no on Motion 4, for the following reasons. I am interested in striving to secure the safety of Comrades Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, and believe that this can best be accomplished by enlisting all the elements of organized labor to pay strict attention to the affairs of the trial, and to contribute such sums as the limited ability of wageworkers permit them. I do not believe that a lot of hot air, gush and De Leonistic denunciation of the trades union movement in general will assist in bringing about that which is so much needed in this affair, a united

NATIONAL NOTES.

The Socialists of Cook County, Ill., were successful in their legal assault upon the obnoxious primary law passed by the late Legislature of Illinois. One of the features of the law required the payment of fees with nominating petitions, and required twenty instead of ten per cent. of the total vote to be cast by a party to insure legal standing. Immediately upon the decision being rendered favorable to the Socialists, a special session of the Legislature has been called.

The Socialists of Racine, Wis., elected four Aldermen to the City Council. This is a gain of one over last year.

The Socialists of Red Lodge, Mont., elected the Mayor, Police Magistrate and two Aldermen. The Democrats and Republicans had combined on a fusion ticket.

The vote at Livingston, Mont., for Aldermen was as follows: First Ward—Republican, 98; Democrat, 68; Socialists, 64. Second Ward—Socialists, 16. This is the business men's ward. Third Ward—Socialists, 55; Democrats, 50; Republicans, 42. The Socialist vote is 25 per cent. of the total vote cast. Last year it was 18 per cent. Reports at hand from Montana indicate that the Socialist vote has increased at all points where a municipal contest was made.

The vote of the Social Democratic party in Milwaukee for Mayor was 16,837. This is an increase of about 1,000 over the vote for Mayor in 1904. The Socialist Labor party vote for Mayor was 116. As a result of the election twelve Socialists will occupy seats in the City Council, a gain of three over last year. Four Supervisors and two Justices of the Peace were elected.

Durant, Indian Territory, in the first municipal election, out of a total vote of 579 shows a record of 138 Socialist votes.

Blair, Neb., 66 Socialist votes against 40 in 1905.

It was reported that an unattached organization was trying to control the Socialist primaries in Omaha, Neb., and nominated a ticket in opposition to the party nominees. This attempt was unsuccessful and the entire ticket proposed by Local Omaha was nominated at the primaries.

Mystic, Ia.—For Mayor, F. T. Romsburg, Socialist, 298 votes; Republican candidate, 220 votes; for Treasurer, W. B. Bedinger, Socialist, elected by 36 majority; First Ward, to fill vacancy, N. H. Barnes, Socialist, elected by 20 majority; First Ward, full term, Joseph Baker, Socialist, elected by 16 majority; Third Ward, E. G. Street, Socialist, elected by 70 majority. The Republicans elected the City Assessor by a majority of 8, and the Second Ward Councilmen by a majority of 11. The Republicans and Democrats were combined against the Socialists.

A. L. Smith, 1004 North Rocheblave street, New Orleans, La., has been elected a member of the National Committee for Louisiana.

W. A. Stulce, member of Local Soddy, Tenn., has been expelled from the party for taking part in the Democratic convention and accepting an appointment as Deputy Sheriff.

Financial Secretary Comrade Morrill, of the Haverhill (Mass.) Club, collected \$94 in dues in ninety days. It is suggested that other clubs should adopt the idea of appointing a collector.

One Assembly district in New York on January 1st had nineteen good standing members in the organization. There were 291 Socialist votes cast in this district in November. One of the members, realizing the small percentage of members to voters in the district, took it upon himself to hunt up the voters and during January and February received fifty-five applications for membership, with one or more months' dues from each. The membership of that Assembly district at the present date is eighty-nine.

The election of Local Bisbee, Ariz., where the union-wrecking and Socialist-annihilating citizens' alliance is so much in evidence, resulted as follows: Republican, 547; Democrats, 401; Socialists, 85. The secretary reports that this is as much as could be expected, considering the fact that about 400 of the most active spirits were compelled to leave the camp during the last month. The capitalists are openly advocating the driving of the Socialists out of the country, and a workingman seen talking to any known Socialist is discharged and blacklisted.

The State convention of the Socialist party of Missouri will be held at Jefferson City on May 30th.

The arrest of one of our comrades in Greenville, S. C., for distributing handbills announcing the meeting of Comrade Pitts resulted in increasing the enthusiasm and the size of the audience which attended the meeting.

At the recent meeting of the International Socialist Bureau it was decided to increase the dues of most of the affiliated parties. The dues heretofore have been 800 francs for each nation represented. The change has been made with regard to the relative strengthening of the party in the several countries. The dues for Germany are now 2,500 francs per annum. Those for France, England and the United States are 1,250 francs per annum.

A charter has been granted by the National office to Gallup, New Mexico. Thirteen members.

Charles L. Breckon, Secretary of Local Cook County, reports that Charles J. Geist, a printer, was expelled from the party for scabbing. He has left the city of Chicago and is presumed to be somewhere in the interior of the State of Illinois.

Walter V. Holloway, 1811 Berkeleyway, Berkeley, Cal., has been elected a member of the National Committee.

In 1904 the vote of Wood County, W. Va., in which is situated the city of Parkersburg, W. Va., 47 Socialist votes were cast, while in the recent city election of Parkersburg 297 Socialist votes were cast.

The State convention of New Jersey will be held at West Hoboken on May 30th.

The Iowa State convention will be held at Des Moines on July 4th.

Comrade Sol Fieldman was arrested in Greenfield, Mass., on April 17th for speaking on the street. The next day he was fined \$5, which he refused to pay, and was sent to the county jail. At 10 a. m. he was put in prison garb and put to work at caning chairs at 1 p. m. About 4 o'clock one of the local comrades insisted upon paying the fine, and Comrade Fieldman was released. The same and the next evening he spoke to immense audiences on the street and was not molested.

The obnoxious feature (that requiring fees from candidates for public office) of the North Dakota primary law, has been declared unconstitutional by an opinion rendered by the Attorney General, C. N. Frich. He bases his decision largely upon the decision of the Supreme courts of Illinois and Nebraska, which affected similar statutory provisions. It should be remembered that both of these decisions were secured upon action taken by the Socialist organizations of Illinois and Nebraska.

The Ohio Socialist State convention will be held at Columbus on May 26th and 27th.

The Kansas State convention will be held at Emporia on May 11th and 12th.

Five members of Local Sioux Falls, South Dakota, were found guilty of supporting the Municipal League candidates, which announced as its platform purity in city politics and had for its purpose the defeat of the present city administration and to place in power another capitalistic one. The members thus offending were promptly expelled by Local Sioux Falls.

Fully 3,000 men and women were in the Moyer-Haywood parade (organized by the Allegheny County, Pa. Local) Saturday night, April 21st. Carnegie Hall was filled to suffocation, the collection amounting to \$139. Ben Hanford, of the Socialist party, and C. O. Sherman, of the I. W. W., were the speakers.

Local Washington, D. C., desires to have the attention of the comrades directed to an article in the March number of Everybody's Magazine, wherein the Pinkerton detective, McParland, is given the certificate of good character and lauded to the skies as an exemplary citizen. Local Washington further suggests that in view of the known unsavory record of this limb of capitalism, locals and individual Socialists should write to Everybody's Magazine, published by the Ridgeway-Thayer Company, Union Square, New York, N. Y., requesting them to investigate McParland's record and to publish the facts in the interest of fair play.

Resolutions in reference to the Moyer-Haywood outrage have reached the National office from several hundred locals. It is not so important that they reach here, but that every local to the last one pass resolutions and forward them to Governor Gooding of Idaho. Comrades should see to it that every labor organization which they can reach takes similar action and that more and yet more public protest meetings be held. Every local should be listed among the contributors, whether the amount be large or small. The important issue to comrades and workingmen at this day in our country is to provide for the proper defense of these comrades of ours, the victims of capitalist conspiracy and class hatred.

The outlook for the polling of a large vote at the coming Congressional elections is most gratifying. The organizing of locals and enrollment of members is going forward at an unprecedented rate, as indicated by the reports of lecturers and organizers now in the field. It may be modestly assumed that a month's work is now being accomplished in ten days as compared with previous records. Large, enthusiastic and intensely interested audiences are the rule, with a manifest eagerness to study Socialism.

Comrade Arthur Morrow Lewis' literature sales amounted to more than \$100 at five points in Arizona alone.

One thousand five hundred and forty-three dollars and fifty-eight cents has been paid to National organizers from January 1st to April 30th. Two hundred and eighty-one dollars and eleven cents was paid last year for the same period.

Now 500,000 pledges of \$5.00 will be two and one-half millions of dollars. Really Comrades, we should make it five million for we must show the vena cava of the Mine Owners' Association that if they persist in demanding the martyrdom of these men, who were too pure to be corrupted by their gold, too fearless to cower before their browbeating reign of terrorism, yes, men who preferred the slimy filth of the bull pen with a true heart to a traitor's seat in the banquet halls of capitalism, with the vulture beaked carrion crows of robbery and rapine as they feast on the prostrate body of betrayed labor. Yes, if they hang them we will flood the country with a tide of revolutionary agitation that will sweep the whole structure of piracy into the gulf of oblivion.
