the current year, Charles H. Moyer, president, and William D. Haywood, secretary
of the Western Federation of Miners, together with George A. Pettibone, were kidnapped from their homes in Denver, to Idaho. The amdavits on which the arrests
were made are now admitted by the prosecution to have been false, in that they
charged the accused with being in the state
of Idaho at the time of the death of former
Governor Stuenenberg.

The prisoners were denied the advice
of counsel, and consequently the opportunities of a writ of habeas corpus, and rushed
out of Colorado, during the night, on a
secret special train.

Claim for the rights of the prisoners to
a writ of habeas corpus was filed with
the United States Styreme Court early
in the month of May. The hearing was
set for October 9th, and held on that date,
after which the matter was taken under
advisement.

E. L. RODGERS, NATIONAL COM-MITTEE MEMBER OF OHIO, MOTION NO. 17.

"I move that the National Office place at least one organizer in the field (with privilege of increasing the number, as found advisable), on or before March 1st, 1907, whose duties shall be as follows:

"He or they shall be assigned to certain compact sections, where there are already some Socialists, and remain there until a local shall have been organized in each city or town and placed in good working order.

"He shall instruct the locals how to conduct the regular business of a local. How to arrange and advertise agitation meetings, how to work their local newspapers for publicity of their work, etc., etc."

#### COMMENT.

"The organizers or circuit speakers in the employ of the National Office do very little real organizing. They speak in one place one day and in another place the next day, and when they occasionally organize a local they are compelled to at once move on and leave the new comrades to get along the best way they can. The present method creates Socialist sentiment, but adds very little to the strength of the party movement.

"It may be said this proposed method would be costly. Perhaps it would be, but the results would be permanent, and sooner or later the money would all come back in the way of dues. The different state movements no doubt would be willing to bear part of the expense of such organizers while they were working in their respective states.

"I heartily welcome National Committeeman Rodgers' motion, which just forestalls one that I had in mind for the same purpose. With few exceptions, the comrades on our list of national lecturers and organizers are simply lecturers and not organizers, and almost without exception the work that they are doing is that of lecturing, not of organizers. It may cost the National Office as much to keep one organizer in the field in accordance with Comrade Rodgers' motion as to route three or four lecturers as has been done, but the money will be well spent and in the long run it will return in increased dues and an increased demand for propagandists. J. Weber, for county attorney, on the American ticket. The endorsement also has the signature of the State Secretary, H. P. Burt. The same issue states that the Socialist party made no nomination for county attorney. If the failure to nominate a condidate for that office, and the endorsement of Weber is true, then Section 3 of Article XII of the National Constitution has been violated by members of the Socialist party of Utah.

"Knowing these facts, I advised all our people who were going to vote for a county attorney to vote for A. J. Weber, and I have no apology to offer.

"4. If there is any blame or censure, you can charge it up to me. The party had nothing to do with it. I am tough and it won't hurt me to carry the stigma of ostracism pronounced by professional heresy hunters.

"Resolved, That an advisory ballot of the National Committee be taken as to the expediency of the repeal of the amendments adopted December 22, 1905, in Article VI. Section 1, and Article VII, Section 1, of the National Constitution."

#### COMMENT.

"The amendments referred to, adopted December 22, 1905, provide for the election of the National Secretary and the National Executive Committee by direct vote of the party. The national committeemen being similarly elected in their respective states, we have thus three distinct bodies deriving authority directly from the membership and only nominally responsible to one another. With our administrative organization so constituted, I can conceive of a crisis involving differences over, immediate tactical action which would precipitate hopeless confusion and deadlock at a time when such a condition would be fatal to the party's usefulness.

"I cannot but believe that these amend-

usefulness.

"I cannot but believe that these amendments, which emasculate the National Committee and inflict upon us so cumbrous and unwieldy an organization, received their large endorsement solely through the predisposition of members to favor all applications of the referendum as a principle, without reflection that it may be so imposed as to cripple the executive efficiency of the party. I believe that the Executive Committee and the National Secretary should be elected by, responsible to and removable by the National Committee, thus obviating any divided responsibility.

"It is not at all undemocratic to place

"It is not at all undemocratic to place full responsibility upon the National Committee, so long as any member of that body is subject to recall by the party membership.

ship.

"Realizing that these amendments were adopted by a substantial majority, and wishing to avoid the expense which would be entailed should Massachusetts move unsuccessfully for their repeal, I adopt this method to ascertain if the National Committeemen are alive to the dubious character of our executive organization, and if they are willing to do the educative work among the members necessary to its successful improvement.

Section 1 of Article 5 of the Constitution, which deals with the "Dutles and Powers of the National Committee", gives the National Committee no power to deal with the organic law or act as advisors of legislation pertaining thereto. Article XI of the Constitution specifically defines the methods of procedure relating to amendments to the Constitution.

The advisory ballot on constitutional matters by the National Committee is a proposition not provided for by law and without a precedent.

The National Executive Committee in session went so far as to deny space in the minutes to suggestions dealing with constitutional amendments, taking the ground that it would be an invasion of the prerogatives of the membership as set forth in the Constitution.

An audience of 250 at ten cents admission will cover these appearances including hall will cover these expenses, including hall

will cover these expenses, including hall rent. Where larger audiences can be secured, larger hall rent can be paid.

2. The advertising should be more expensive than has been customary for Socialist speakers. All the printing for each speaker should be done at the Chicago office. We think that, to a moderate degree, theatrical methods of advertising might be adopted. The speakvertising might be adopted. The speakers should be generously billed as attractions. The idea in advertising should be solely to draw crowds to the speaker, and not to show that we are not "ashamed of the party." The general printing for each speaker should cost not less than \$50, and might profitably be more.

Each local on each circuit should have a speaker once a month;—for instance, one local would have a speaker on the first Monday in each month, the next local on the first Tuesday in each month, and so forth. Among other reasons, this will in most cities enable the local to obtain a reduction in hall rent. Each local on each circuit should be required to take all the speakers billed on that circuit. We believe that three such circuits should be formed, and that the speakers should leave Chicago a week apart. Several of the locals on Puget Sound will desire to be billed on at least two circuits, and Seattle wishes to be on three circuits, possibly on four, if so many are formed, thus providing for its Sunday night meetings, for which this plan was devised. We feel sure that there are other locals on the way which would desire to take a speaker once a week in this manner. The class of speakers desired, and which we think can be secured, will fill a house in any city any night in the week. We believe that Seattle should be given Sunday night as the originator of the plan.

4. We have placed the daily wage at five dollars, because we wish to have only the speakers who can attract large crowds, and whose Socialism is of the right brand.

5. We think that a tour on any of these would require about three weeks time, and many comrades of national reputation who are not in the habit of making Socialist tours would be glad of an opportunity of making the round on any of those circuits at the wages proposed.

We hope that the National Secretary will find a feasible plan along these lines for providing the larger towns with speakers able to attract audiences of sufficient size. While we desire to have the plan in working order at the earliest possible day, the speakers' committee would like an opportunity to discuss any material changes with the National Sec-retary. # REPORT OF SUB-COMMITTEE ON METHODS OF OR-GANIZATION.

In view of the importance of more After a thorough discussion on methods of organization for 1907 it was moved by Towner that a sub-committee campaign of 1908, the National Execugenera tive Committee proposes that the ener gies and resources of the national office be concentrated principally, during 1907, on organizing work wherever such appears to be most needed, or conditions appear to be most favorable. As the most feasible method of conducting this work, it is proposed that the country be subdivided into districts consisting of certain states, an organizer to be selected for each district to work therein for a definite period, providing such or-ganizer be acceptable to the different state committees within the territory.

It is proposed in pursuance of this plan, that all existing contracts with or-ganizers expire not later than March 1, 1907, and contracts made with organizers appointed to extend from that or any succeeding date to not later than Dec. 1, 1907. This would ensure an organizer engaged from March 1, at least nine months' employment, and others engaged after that date in proportion.

It is understood that organizers can be changed or transferred from any given territory whenever conditions should necessitate such change or transfer.

It is not proposed that the lecture work be entirely abandoned, but the pressing necessity of direct organizing makes it essential that the lecture feature is necessary to have the strongest speak-ers, and with this in view it desires to ers can be later sent out to supplement We believe that the time has come that will cover the expense of the lec-when propaganda in the larger towns should be arranged for separately from ganizing.

#### EVENING SESSION.

Dec. 17, 1906. Meeting called to order 7:50. Com-rades Floaten, Kerr, Mailly, Towner and Work present. Comrade Kerr elected chairman.

Comrade B. Berlyn appeared before the committee in behalf of the Chicago Daily Socialist.

Motion by Floaten: "I move that this ommittee select a representative of the Socialist party to act at the Moyer, Hay-wood, Pettibone trial, to provide re-ports to all Socialist and other papers desiring the same." Carried.

It was decided that National Secretary Barnes act with Comrade Towner in visiting Indianapolis, and attempt to obtain the approval of representatives of national trades unions with headquarters in that city to the above document; and in that city to the above document; and that Comrade Mailly on his return trip to New York, also act similarly with Comrade Towner in Cincinnati, and afterwards proceed to Washington to lay the matter before President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, with the following letter:

Samuel Gompers,

President American Federation of Labor.

Labor, 423 "G" St. N. W.,

Washington, D. C. Dear Sir: By direction of the National Executive Committee, and the courtesy of William Mailly, I hereby transmit certain documents, containing sentiments expressed by representatives of various labor organizations and trade unions, relating to the persecution and pending trial of Messrs. Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone.

When this communication reaches your hands, the National Executive Committee will have adjourned, and in view of this fact, unless you can at once reply to bearer, you are respectfully requested to reply to the undersigned.

Hoping you will appreciate the necessity of a speedy reply,

It was voted to insert the following statement in the minutes:

The National Executive Committee onsidered fully the present situation affecting the imprisonment and trial of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, and reached the conclusion that extraordinary means had to be invoked to get the best results. We realized that this could not be achieved unless the active and widespread co-operation of the trades unions be insured. We realized, too, for reasons apparent to all, that a call for a National Conference to organize a na-tional movement, issuing from the Socialist party would not receive the re-sponse a call emanating from represent-ative trades unions would get. This fact is one which we must face, however, much as we may deplore it.

In line with this, the National Execu-tive Committee used all legitimate means to enlist the co-operation of representatives of national trades unions in a national conference called under the auspices of the American Federation of Labor, thus striving to accomplish on a national scale what has already been done in localities for the same cause. President Gompers' positive declarations on the kidnaping of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, to the recent Minneapolis convention, justified us in believing this could be done.

The emergency confronting us re-quires, in our opinion, that for the time being, all political and economic differences be subordinated to the unity of the working class of all shades of political and economic belief in the effort to free our comrades from the fate which conspiracy of organized capital has evidently marked out for them.

Motion by Towner: "I move that we do now adjorn." Carried.
