Call for National Party Referendum "D," 1909.

Section 1. The name of this organization shall be the Socialist Party, except in states where a different name is a legal requirement.

Section 1. Every person, resident of the United States, of the age of eighteen years or more, who has severed his connection with all other political parties, shall be eligible to membership.

Any person occupying a position, honorary or remunerative, by the gift of any party other than the Socialist Party, shall not be eligible to membership.

All persons joining the party shall sign a pledge recognizing the class struggle between the capitalist class and the working class and indorse the party platforms and constitutions.

No member of the party shall under any pretext interfere with the regular organized movement in another state than of his residence.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The affairs of the party shall be administered by general party referendum.

Motions and resolutions shall be submitted to reference.

Management.

Motions and resolutions shall be submitted to referendum upon the request of twenty locals in five or more states or territories, or of any smaller number of locals in three states having two thousand members in the aggregate.

When a request for a referendum is presented as above provided, it shall be published in the party press and shall stand open for thirty days, in which time amendments thereto may be offered in the same manner in which original referendum is initiated, and at the close of the thirty days, the original motion, together with all amendments initiated, shall be submitted to referendum.

All referendums shall be submitted without preamble or comment.

Sec. 3. It shall not be the duty of National headquarters to conduct organization except in unorganized states or territories, or to conduct agitation and distribution of literature except in presidential compaign years.

Sec. 8. The state secretaries shall file a copy of their monthly reports with the National Secretary on or before the tenth of each month following the month of which said report was rendered.

Sec. 9. The state secretaries shall make an exact duplicate of every application for membership admitted and forward the same to the National office.

through this office. The State Committee will co-operate with the Local Defense League in Los Angeles, but I hold that the regular State Organization should make itself responsible for the defense of De Lara, and see to it that the case does not fall into the hands of lawyers who do not understand the class war, and, therefore, cannot understand the most effective line of battle."

COMMENT.

CALIFORNIA (Richardson)—On motion No. 9, now before me, I do not care to vote. It provides for taking initial steps for setting time and place of holding a rational congress of the party in 1919.

We are at the same time informed that the cost of holding such a meeting will approximate \$8.500. Personally I think that, in the conditions that obtain the Socialist Party, such a meeting at such an expense savors more of a luxury than of a necessity. If the National Secretary will suggest the caslest way for calling off that meeting it will be one of the best and sanest acts of his administration.

MONTANA (Ambrose)—After carefully considering Motion No. 9, have voted no for the following reasons: First, I think a congress is not necessary. The party is to a great expense in caring for necessary business, and I think the benefit derived from a congress will not pay the party. We can do more with the money by sending speakers throughout the country preaching ssocialism.

KENTICKY (Dobba)—Please note Section 5 of Article iv of the National Party Constitution. Our constitution—and the spirit of our organization seem designed to prevent anything being done expeditiously, but since the party law confers on the National Secretary no power to instate National Committee referendums it ought to be enforced. Accordingly, I decline to vote on a proposition which the National Secretary has no right to submit and desire to be so recorded.

LOUISIANA (Triay)—My reason for voting no is on account of finances to pay delegates, otherwise I'd gladly vote in favor of the congress.
