To All Locals and Branches:

Dear Comrades:—The National Executive Committee has adopted the following motion:

"That a call be issued in the name of the National Executive Committee and the National Secretary, addressed to the locals of the Party, for immediate and liberal financial support to the Los Angeles comrades in their pending campaign; also that two speakers, at least one of them a woman, be sent to Los Angeles forthwith at the expense of the Party."

Los Angeles is the scene of the fiercest battle now raging in the class war. The capitalist foes of labor are determined upon breaking the will of the workers, assassinating their love of liberty, and reducing them to abject servility.

Nobly have the working men and women of Los Angeles risen in their might.

At the primary on October 31, Harriman received 20,157 votes for mayor. This is 3,487 more than his leading opponent. And it comes within 2,533 votes of being a majority over all.

With bold and aggressive effort we carry the city at the election on December 5th.

REPLY TO COMRADE BRAN-STETTER'S QUESTION AS TO CONFERENCE.

BY MAY WOOD-SIMONS.

I was requested by Socialists not members of the committee to bring this matter before the committee, and being in accord with the suggestion have done so. I have not worked details natu-rally, but believed the conference would be similar to the International Confer-ence at Copenhagen and the conferences held by women of Austria and Germany quite frequently. I am now of the opinion that the conference should be held for, say, two days before the convention, be made up of red-card delegates from as many locals as can send them. Some women will no doubt pay their own way. Women coming to the convention would act also in the

Our action, of course, would not be binding—resolutions passed, etc.—but would express the opinion of a majority. and the conference offer an opportunity to work out plans and bring better un-derstanding. I should therefore imag-ine that it would be well to invite trade union women to participate in discussions—not voting if not a member of the party on any resolutions passed. All

COMMENT ON VOTE ON COM-RADE LEWIS' AMENDMENT BY COMRADE SIMONS.

May Day has repeatedly been used by Socialists as a day for demonstrations for universal suffrage-for example, in Prussia against the three class suffrage. I have been asked several times by locals to speak on woman suffrage on May Day. In using it for a woman suffrage day wherever possible we are following European precedent, and will reach the ear of the working men, without whose support our efforts amount to

On Woman's Day this year compara-tively few locals held a meeting. Some of the largest suffrage meetings were not held on Woman's Day, for instance, Carnegie Hall, New York, and the Bos-

There has been a general impression in the locals that women should be the speakers on Woman's Day. The call for them is always larger than the supply. As a result, locals hold no

On May Day large numbers of meetings are arranged, both men and women speaking, which is, I think, the best thing to have at the suffrage meetings. If the subject is worked up right, I believe the men will help enthusiastically, large parades can be held, union girls interested and more accomplished for the suffrage, which is what we desire, not the mere setting up of another day.

COMMENT ON PROPOSED WOM-. AN'S CONFERENCE.

Lena Morrow Lewis: I believe that all women regularly elected to the Na-tional Convention—state correspondents and women organizers—the National Woman's Committee, and women who are also on the National Committee,

and state secretaries, shall be eligible to vote at the conference, and the con-ference can decide who shall have the

right to the floor.

I am opposed to electing women from the locals to this conference, for then it will raise confusion, and the men will think that the women can have their meeting all by themselves and there will be no need to elect any women to the regular National Convention.

We must never allow our woman's committees or conferences to be the means of eliminating the women from the regular party work. The activity of the Woman's Committee ought to result in an increased number of women being elected to the regular offices and positions within the gift of the party. The idea seems to prevail among some people that the Woman's Committee and Woman's Conference gives the women a place to exert their energies and takes them out of the domain of regular

party work.

The Socialist party is not a man's party—it is composed of both men and women, and the work of the Woman's Committee should be such as to emphasize this fact.

Therefore, out of the regularly elected delegates to the National Convention, together with the women state secretaries, general correspondents, Na-tional Woman's Committee and women members of the National Committee, I suggest that these make up the conference and the body make its own rules after coming to order.

Winnie E. Branstetter: There are

so many reasons against such a con-ference that I feel they outweigh all the possible advantages, which, to my

mind, are few:
1. Our committee has no authority to call such conferences, congresses or conventions. See Article X, Sections 1, 2, 3 and 4, and Article XV, Section 2, of the National Party Constitution.

Thus the conference itself, as well as any action which we might take, would necessarily be unofficial, without bindting force upon any portion or committee of the organization or upon the membership generally.

2. If such a conference were constitutional and desirable, it should not be called by this committee eight months.

in advance of the time, when a new committee is to be elected in the in-

The committee elected for 1912 will no doubt be as capable of deciding this question and of making necessary arrangements as we are, and will have ample time to do so.

I am certainly opposed to the present committee legislating so far in advance

I am certainly opposed to the present of our term and usurping the functions of the incoming committee.

There are no provisions in the national, or the various state, party con-stitutions, for apportioning delegates to such a conference, or by which a just and equitable representation could be secured, or for paying the expenses of

We have every reason for supposing that very few locals would respond to our call and send a regularly elected delegate, and that practically none of them would pay the expenses of a dele-gate to such an informal and unofficial conference when they already have rep-resentation in the regular convention.

The result would be that outside of those active Socialist women who will be attending the regular convention as delegates or committee members, the conference would consist of a handful of middle-class women who can afford to pay their own expenses and who would come as the self-appointed rep-resentatives of the thousands of housewives and wage-earning women who are active party members, and who did not and possibly would not if consulted, consent to such bourgeois representation, or to the measures which such a group of women might advocate.

4. If this conference is not to be

an official one, with authority to make formal recommendations to the regular convention, which will be received by that body as authorized and official recommendations, I deem it inadvisable for our committee to attach dignity or importance to it or give it the stamp of our approval by issuing a call there-

Such a woman's conference may be helpful in European countries, where conditions are such that separate or-ganizations for women are a recognized force and sanctioned by the Socialist party organizations. In this country we have discouraged separate Socialist organizations for women and have refused to officially recognize such organizations. A call for such a conference as is proposed would be inconsistent with the past (and present) policy of our committee and of our national or-

I believe the committee and the Socialist women generally can secure better results in 1912 by the Woman's National Committee urging the women comrades who may be nominated as delegates to the regular convention to accept such nominations, and by recommending to the membership generally that they elect a reasonable proportion of women as members of their respective state delegations.

Then let us have our discussion of

respective state delegations.

Then let us have our discussion of woman's special interests in a caucus of these elected women delegates and the Woman's National Committee, a truly representative gathering of Socialist women. Recommendations coming from such a caucus of authorized delegates to the regular convention would be seriously received and considered by the convention, and the membership of the caucus would be

upon the floor of the convention as delegates to advocate and work for the adoption of their recommendations.

Taking it as a whole, I can see very little good which a specially called conference can accomplish which will not, and which should not, be dealt with by the National Convention of the Socialist party.

A call for such a conference, issued at the time of the election of delegates to the convention, will be confusing to the membership and would undoubtedly result in reducing the number of women delegates elected to the convention, which would be deplorable. I would rather see fifty women seated as regu-lar delegates in the National Conven-tion of our party than to see five hun-dred of them in an unofficial, useless and powerless conference. and powerless conference.

Let us hold our party to its full duty

as a working-class party of represent-ing the working women as well as the working men. We can do this only by active participation in party affairs, as delegates to the party conventions, as members of committees, and by making our demands of the Socialist party through the regular party channels in a dignified, democratic and class-conscious manner, as working-class members of the Socialist party, instead of through an informal, bourgeois woman's con-

ican Woman Suffrage Association: Greetings-In view of the fact that we are requesting the assistance of your organization in securing signatures to the woman suffrage petition, now be-ing circulated by the Socialist party, we deem it proper and fitting that we call your attention to the attitude and rec-

ord of our party on this issue.

For this purpose we quote the following official declarations of our organization, adopted by conventions and ratified by referendum vote of the party

membership:
Socialist National Platform of 1908:
"10. Unrestricted and equal suffrage

for men and women, and we pledge ourselves to engage in an active campaign in that direction."

Resolution adopted by National Socialist Congress, 1910:

"Whereas, Woman's position in industry is of a much lower status than man's as the direct result of her political disqualifications; and

"Whereas. The Socialist party is the

"Whereas, The Socialist party is the direct representative of the working class, regardless of sex; therefore be it "Resolved, That the Socialist party demands equal suffrage, regardless of sex, color or race, and pledges itself to work, advocate and agitate for it."

Extract from report on propaganda, adopted by Socialist Congress, 1910:

gan its political career with a demand for equal political rights for all adults, without distinction of class or sex, and the platform of our own party centains a specific pledge that the Socialists of America would engage in an active campaign for unrestricted and equal suffrage for men and women. This pledge was made in good faith and must be redeemed unequivocally and whole-heartedly. Our propaganda for the enfranchisement of women must be carried on, not spasmodically and perfunctorily, but steadily and enthusiastically. We must allow no opportunity for such propaganda to escape. Whether it be a legislative hearing, a public demonstration or discussion, the ut distinction of class or sex, and public demonstration or discussion, the Socialists should range themselves on all occasions with the advocate of woman suffrage."

The membership of our party has heartily endorsed the declarations of the national organization, and the platforms of our respective state organiza-tions contain strong and emphatic demands for votes for women.

We have not only made declarations in favor of woman suffrage, but have proved our sincerity by active and effective work in national and state campaigns. When your association circulated its petition to Congress last year our organization gave its endorsement and sent in four thousand sheets of signatures collected by our membership.

In all state campaigns for unlimited suffrage the Socialist party has taken an active part and given the Suffrage

Association every assistance and support, as the following quotations and
resolution will verify:

of the women, our National American Woman's Suffrage Association would not stand for it, because of the principle involved."

Minutes of the National Executive Committee of the Socialist Party

Sessions October 14 and 15, at Bridgeport, Conn.

SATURDAY MORNING SESSION, OCTOBER 14.

Meeting called to order by Acting National Secretary Work at 10 a. m. All members present except Berger. Hillquit elected chairman. Elizabeth Goldstein elected secretary.

The result of the committee's vote on time and place of meeting was reported by Comrade Work as fol-

Equal Suffrage.

A telegram was read from Caroline Lowe, General Correspondent of the Woman's National Committee, concerning the California suffrage victory, and the suffrage petition now

being circulated by the party.

Moved that Spargo and Lewis draw up a statement on the California suf-frage victory. Carried.

Congressional Activity.

Comrade Ghent was present, and on behalf of Comrade Berger reported on the work in Washington during the special session of Congress. the special session of Congress.
Comrade Berger had introduced eleven bills and resolutions, the most important of which were the joint resolutions demanding the withdrawal of the troops from the Mexican border; the concurrent resolution on the McNamara case; the two joint resolutions proposing amendments to the constitution-one for a constitutional convention and the other for the abolition of the Senate; the amending the interstate extradition law, and the bill for old-age pensions. The McNamara resolution was followed by two hearings before the House Committee on Rules, at which important testimony was introduced, which, by vote of the committee, was reported to the House with the recommendation that it be turned over to the Judiciary Committee. The House adopted the report without division. It is expected that a hear-ing on the extradition question will be held by the Judiciary Committee at an early date during the coming session.

Comrade Berger was appointed to the District of Columbia Committee, and a considerable part of his time has been spent in the investigation of labor and housing conditions of

A vast mass of correspondence on every conceivable subject has been handled by Comrade Berger's office. Much of this has been of the nature of specific complaints, necessitating Comrade Berger's intervention with the various departments.

In addition to the two formal state-ments made before the Committee on Rules in the McNamara case, Comrade Berger made two speeches on the floor of the House. The first of them, that on the wool schedule, has been circulated to the number of some 665,000 copies; the second, on oldage pensions, to the number of some 75,000 copies.

Comrade Ghent requested that

some further provisions be made for clerical help and other expenses in the Congressional office, beginning with the December session. From the first week in May to the 10th day of August the National Office had contributed \$15 a week for this purpose, the remainder, amounting to somewhat more than \$20 a week, hav-ing been paid by Comrade Berger

Moved that the report of Comrade Berger's work in the special session of Congress be accepted and approved. Comrade Berger's work in Congress has worthily maintained the best traditions of the international Socialist movement. It has been aggressive and efficient, and of vast propaganda value for the cause of Socialism. The party may well hope that the next Congressional elections will see a large group elected to Con-Carried.

Moved that a committee be elected to consider the specific measures introduced by Comrade Berger and to report upon them. Carried. Hillquit and Spargo elected.

Moved that copies of the two pro-osed bills mentioned by Comrade posed bills mentioned by Comrade Ghent, one dealing with national own-ership of certain industries, and the other with certain proposed regulation with reference to conditions of labor, be submitted to the National Secretary, and copies of the draft be furnished to each member of the National Executive Committee for ac-Carried.

Moved that the National Executive Committee appropriate the sum of \$25 per week toward clerical expenses of Comrade Berger's office in Washington, beginning with the December session of Congress. Discussion regarding amount the National Office might be able to pay, owing to pres-ent financial condition of office. De-cided to defer action until after the Acting National Secretary's report on

The Strike.

Communication from John C. Carroll, of the Chicago Daily Socialist, concerning the strike of shop workers on the Illinois Central, and Union

and Southern Pacific railroads, was

Moved that Comrades Goebel and Carey act as a committee to draft a telegram. Carried.

Race Question.

Comrade Work read a resolution from Local New York in reference to the negro situation in the South.

Moved that the Acting National Secretary be instructed to write to the organizer of Local New York and to ask him for the specific instances and names of locals where these exclusions are alleged to have occurred, and on receipt of desired information that the Acting National Secretary-write to the secretaries of the state organizations concerned and get full information. Carried.

Finances.

Moved to have a report on finances. Carried.

The Acting National Secretary read the detailed account of the finances of the party for the month of September, as published in the Monthly Bulletin, calling attention to the fact that the debts amounted to \$5,930.76. Since that time a few of these debts have been paid, but additional obligations for printing and other necessary expenses have been incurred. For lack of ready money it has usually not been possible to take advantage of discounts for cash. Field workers have had to wait for their wages. Some of them have had to borrow money from comrades along the way because there were not sufficient funds at the National Office to send them their expense money. The money on the Lyceum Bureau is ginning to come in. It is hoped that the Lyceum Department will pay its own way in the long run. When the Lyceum funds begin to come in more plentifully they will probably make it possible to pay off all the debts, which are largely due to the Lyceum Department. But when this is accomplished, except for payment of cur-rent expenses, the Lyceum funds ought to be preserved in order to pay the wages and expenses of the lectur-ers when they take the field. He advised that appropriations be kept down to the minimum until the debts are paid and the office placed on a cash basis, so that all discounts can be taken advantage of, all bills paid when presented, and the business of the office transacted without the expensive wastes due to lack of ready

Lengthy discussion ensued on the Lyceum Bureau, its cost to date, and the best manner of keeping its ac-

counts. Moved that the Acting National Secretary be instructed to keep separate books for the Lyceum Bureau. Amendment moved that the Acting National Secretary be instructed to keep his accounts so as to be in a position to account separately for the business of the Lyceum Bureau. Amendment carried. Original motion lost.

After much discussion on the finances of the party, and considera-tion of probable income and ex-penses in the near future, it was the sense of the committee that it was safe to assume that there was about \$2,000 for disposal for the several

purposes.

Meeting adjourned at 1:30 to meet again at 2:30.

'The National Executive Committee of the Socialist Party, in session, sends fraternal greetings and good cheer to all the workers engaged in this great strike. We rejoice at the splendid evidence of solidarity manifested by the unions of the various railroad crafts. The use of the judicial injunction and similar means of oppression by the capitalist class points clearly to the need for political solidarity by the workers. Whatever assistance the Socialist Party can render through its press or otherwise will be gladly and freely given.'

Moved that this telegram be adopted and sent. Carried.

Alaska.

The following report of National Organizer Goebel was read:

"Newark, N. J., "October 1, 1911.

"To the National Executive Commit-tee, Socialist Party:

'Comrades-I presented to your August session a report to date of my Alaska tour. On my return, September 20, from Alaska, I found September 20, from Alaska, I found awaiting me at Seattle the Bulletin announcing that a majority of the National Committee had voted to recall me from Alaska. In view of this singular action by the committee (many, if not all, of whom must have been absolutely ignorant of conditions in Alaska), I feel that justice to the rank and file at home, and the the rank and file at home, and Alaskan comrades in particular, demands a further report.

"It seems an outrage that, having given of time and money and effort as did the Alaskan comrades, they should find their own comrades vot-ing to treat them the same as do the capitalist politicians at Washingtonas savages and wards, to be exploited but never helped. Certainly it would but never helped. Certainly it would seem the province of a national or-ganization, through its committee or officials, to develop and organize every portion of the territory under its jurisdiction, even though it entail expense, as was not the case with the work in Alaska.

"Comment has been made that we should confine our efforts to industrial centers. Alaska is nothing but industrial. I doubt if there are fifty farmers in Alaska, and hothouse garleners would be a better term even

deners would be a better term even for them.

"And from a merely political viewpoint, Alaska should have immediate co-operation and help. It seems certain that Congress, this winter, will give Alaska some form of territorial give Alaska some form of territorial government. As the mass of the neogovernment. As the mass of the peo-ple are of a radical disposition, dis-gusted with old parties, have the working-class viewpoint, and show a wonderful amount of class conscious-

wonderful amount of class consciousness, it is more than possible the Socialists would be found with a majority control of the Legislature. They would also have a fine chance of electing the delegate to Congress. "Alaska and its resources bids fair to he one of the big issues in the coming Presidential campaign. The Alaskan Congressional election is held in August, just as the Presidential campaign is assuming full headway. There would thus be certain strategic value in an assouncement flashed at such time over the entire United States that Alaska had elected a Socialist to Congress.

"No man can guarantee this would the case, but my experience there, the reception accorded me, the great hunger shown for literature, the high average of the intelligence of the entire population, their freedom from bigotry, and the strangle hold of the Alaska syndicate upon all classes alike, with resultant spirit of revolt and desire for relief, compels me to believe that the expenditure of one thousand dollars for speakers and lit-erature in co-operation with the Alaskan comrades would give us a working-class victory. It may be that not even that sum would be needed, as my tour not only made all expenses but left a balance of \$161, as shown by the following summary of my itemized monthly reports to the National Office:

"In addition to covering all expenses of my trip, we raised money for halls, printing, etc., amounting to large sums, in every town. At Fairbanks and surrounding camps, for instance, we raised in one week over \$400 for local expenses, in addition to \$148 given me, and \$125 left with the local as a literature fund.

"While the trip meant strenuous work, resourcefulness, exacting effort, and many unique experiences, from being washed into the sea to that of being sat on by 'Pinky,' the mule, yet all this was more than matched by the generosity of these people, men whose yearly wages do not average over \$500, freely giving five and ten dollars each, and other comrades whose working days, because of seasonal limitations, cannot exceed 90 or 100, giving from one to four days 'mushing' up the creeks, spreading the word.

We now have locals or members at large in practically every town or camp of consequence in the territory, both on the coast and in the interior,

"Ketchikan, Wrangell, Petersburg, Juneau, Douglass, Haines, Skagway, Cordova, Valdez, Cliff Mine, Seward, Killisnoo, Nome, Eagle, Deadwood,

Jack Wade, Kempersville, Hot Springs, Tofty, Olnes, Cleary and Fairbanks. "Through the latter local the en-

tire surrounding country, made up of mining camps and small towns, can be handled. "My experience as organizer

teaches me that organizing work, to be permanent and effective, must be followed up. I, therefore, in closing, suggest the following policy for Alaska and ask the committee to put it into effect:

"First-Direct the Acting National Secretary to furnish each town on the southwest and southeast coast with sufficient leaflets to permit a weekly house to house distribution for the four winter months. This would mean about 5,000 leaflets per week, a total of 75,000 leaflets. All these coast towns can be reached at all seasons, and in each are comrades who would distribute them carefully, while the people, having little to do, will read greedily.

"Second—Arrange to at once send a speaker with organizing ability to these coast towns. This would require about two months and come close to or be entirely self-supportclose to or be entirely self-supporting. This speaker, when finished with the coast tour, could go into Fairbanks from Valdez or Cordova over the winter trail. The Fairbanks comrades desire this very earnestly, and will help defray the large expenses. This speaker should stay in Fairbanks two months, lecturing weekly, and, between the weekly lectures, teaching the local how to work, visit nearby camps and help plan for visit nearby camps and help plan for the Congressional campaign.

"Third-In June another speaker should be sent to stay until election in August, and the Congressional candidate, if a speaker, be placed on the list of National Organizers and

toured the duration of the campaign.
"This may seem to the committee, and to the comrades in general, a large program, but it is based on personal observation, study and advice of many right on the field of action. Let us unfurl and carry forward to victory in Alaska, as in Alabama or California, the Red Flag of Socialism and thus prove ourselves a national movement in fact as in name.

"Fraternally yours, "GEO. H. GOEBEL, "National Organizer."

Carried.

Moved that the National Executive Committee issue blank forms of a petition in support of the old age pension bill to be addressed to Congress. Carried.

Moved that we call upon the com-

rades throughout the country to make a special campaign for old age pen-sions by holding meetings, circulating literature, passing resolutions and ob-taining signatures to petitions in sup-port of Comrade Berger's old age pension bill. Carried.

Moved that the Acting National Secretary be instructed to send a telegram to Worcester, Mass., stating that it is absolutely necessary for Comrade Carey to remain in Bridge-port, and that Comrade Hull has been sent to take Carey's place for the meeting at Worcester. Unskilled workers, from \$9 to \$12 per week.

Headquarters.

The Acting National Secretary reported that the National Headquarters has not sufficient room to do its work properly. The present quarters are also unsanitary.
