Dear Comrades: Herewith is submitted for a vote of your body Motion Number 1, proposed by Goebel of New Jersey, and supported by Ball and Huggins of Illinois, Lee of New York, Maurer of Pennsylvania, and Taylor of Nevada.

Motion Number 1.

"That from date of adoption of this motion the National Secretary shall send out ballots for all national referendums without comment or preamble appearing thereon."

Note by National Secretary: The present constitution struck out the provision forbidding preamble and comment, leaving it to the initiating bodies to include such if they so desired. Of course it ought not to be included. The National Secretary does not have authority to leave it out, but if your committee considers that it has authority to direct that it be left out, without a constitutional amendment, well and good. Comments in the Bulletin should also be omitted, unless the other side has equal space, and if the vote on this motion is affirmative I shall deem it proper to draw that inference.

"Dear Comrade: I have yours of the 3d, inclosing ballot on my motion, and your comment.

"I am free to say it is one of the ost astounding things I have seen. In the first place you have no business sending out a comment with ballots to the N. C. In the second place, you know it was an accident the provision prohibiting comment was left out of the new constitution. In fact, until I find the copy which I kept of the original report I will not be sure it was left out by the committee. The printer has erred in other things concerning the convention proceedings and I am inclined to think here also.

"You say no comment should accompany a referendum, and yet you suggest insidiously that the motion to leave it out is unconstitutional.

"The thing that has my particular attention, however, is that you will apply my motion to comments in the Bulletin. I am free to tell you if you do it will be only after a mighty pro-test from me against your tacking on to my motion something I did not put in it. My motion has nothing to do with comments in the Bulletin, nor have you any right to make any such

"I confess I do not seem able to follow the working of your logic. You say you have no authority to declare out of order a motion to set aside the will of the membership expressed in Referendum D, and yet you take on yourself authority to include in my motion something I did not put in it. My motion speaks for itself. I knew what I wanted to say—and said it, and that's what will be voted on.

that's what will be voted on.

"I ask immediate advice as to whether you intend to stand on your expressed intention of making my motion apply to comments in the Bulletin. If so, I ask that this letter go out in next communication to the members of the National Committee. I have no desire for controversy not I have no desire for controversy, nor do I intend to have my motion twisted into something it did not deal

"Dear Comrade: Replying to your letter of the 6th, a motion was once made by National Committeeman Noble of Texas to prevent the National Secretary from commenting on Noble of Texas to prevent the National Secretary from commenting on motions. It did not receive sufficient seconds to go to a vote. It has nevertheless been complied with except in cases of necessity. Where a motion affects my official acts, or affects the business of the office in such a way that it could not be voted on intelligently without such comment. no gently without such comment, no reasonable committeeman would want

"Your motion, whether intentionally or not, made it appear that the comment had been printed on the ballot with wrongful motives, and it

therefore required a word from me.
"It is, of course, to be taken for granted that the clause forbidding comment on the ballots was left out comment on the ballots was left out of the constitution purposely, unless the contrary should be shown. This is equivalent to adopting a rule that the initiating bodies may include comment if they so desire. I certainly do doubt the constitutionality of your motion, but believe the doubt should

motion, but believe the doubt should be resolved in favor of it.

Régarding the comments in the Bulletin, there is no desire to read anything into your motion. It is a precedent, or an unwritten rule, that only the original domment on proposed referendums (which includes recalls) should be published. If the yote on your motion should be affirmative, it would seem guite certain

vote on your motion should be affirmative, it would seem quite certain that the National Committee would be agreeable to either eliminating such comment or giving equal space to attacked comrades for reply, and I would act accordingly. The connection between such comment and comment on the ballot is obvious.

"You are in error in stating that I said in a former letter to you that the National Secretary had no authority to declare a motion out of order. The railes give him such authority, and it is probable that it would have been used if the motion to annul Referendum D had received sufficient seconds. What I said was that I do not believe the National Secretary should have such authority. If the should have such authority. If the National Secretary were inclined to be autocratic or unreasonable, it would be a very dangerous power indeed. It is to be hoped that the committee, at its meeting in May, will repeal that rule. The committee would then decide for itself whether a motion were in order or not. If considered not in order they could vote against it regardless of its

Wilson (California): "I vote 'No' on Motion No. 1. Some judiciously brief comment for and against every motion should accompany the same. The National Secretary's comment accompanying this very motion indicates the reason why some comment should appear. In Oregon and California all constitutional amendments, or other measures initiated by the people, or referred to the people. the people, or referred to the people are accompanied by a statement for and a statement against each by some

and a statement against each by some well-known supporter or opponent of each as the case may be. The proponents of a motion should state briefly their case; and vice versa."

Martin (Colorado): "I vote No on Motion No. 1, because there seems to be uncertainty as to its meaning; the mover claiming that its provisions limit it to referendum ballots, and the National Secretary claiming that it covers comments in the Bulletin. I think we need the freest comment on proposed motions, so that each on proposed motions, so that each member may know the reasons for and against any proposed action. If and against any proposed action. the mover can frame a motion cover-ing his point so clearly that it can be understood by the ordinary mind I

understood by the ordinary mind I will gladly support it."

Fenimore (Indiana): "I vote Yes on Motion No. I, believing that the committee has the power to adopt such rules as it may determine, provided they do not conflict with the constitution. I can see no confliction here. I do not believe, however, that the adoption of this motion will furnish authority for omitting comment from the Bulletin."

Wiltse (Iowa): "I vote No for

Wiltse (Iowa): "I vote No for this reason: There is no person who can vote intelligently without some

can vote intelligently without some information pro and con.

The members of the party did not have the proper information in remain to Reference D, and Commode W. D. Haywood was wronged, which I hope will not happen to another comrade again.

"There should be comment pro and con, or none at all. There is not one word in the constitution in regard to

word in the constitution in regard to a comment going out with a referen-dum, or prohibiting the same. Your inference, in my opinion, that the adoption of Motion No. 1 by the National Committee would be unconstitutional has no basis in the constitutional

stitution.
"If there is any logic that could have shown that comment pro and con should be prohibited I would have voted for Motion No. 1. "I am positively opposed to one-

Stallard (Kansas): "All sides to a controversy should have an equal chance; this is not possible if the state initiating a referendum has the right to plead its cause on the face of

the referendum ballot." "I vote No on Motion No. 1, for the reason that Kentucky has, in its constitution, a provision permitting each side to a controversy a comment

"Following the rule thus laid down by our own members, I am constrained

"I do not indorse your view that comments in the Bulletin should be Latimer (Minnesota): "I agree with the statement of the National Secre-

tary, in the note appended to notice No. 1, that comment on the ballot and in the Bulletin should be omitted, but that if desired both sides should have an opportunity to use reasonable space in the Bulletin."

Kruse (Montana): "I vote Yes on Motion No. 1, because it is in line with the rules laid down in our own

state constitution. Its adoption would therefore undoubtedly meet with the approval of the Montana comrades.
"Personally, I believe that on technical grounds the action of the committee might be contested as being unconstitutional; but as the national constitution requires that all amendments of that document made by the committee must be submitted to party referendum, there is no chance for arbitrary action on our part. Then, if the membership puts its stamp of

approval on our action it is possible that the amendment will 'stick.'"

Olmsted (Nebraska): "I vote No on Motion No. 1 for the following reason: I see no good reason for preventing a member making a motion to make known his reason there. tion to make known his reason therefor in a preamble or comment. Like-wise I think every member should have the right to explain his vote. I believe the present method adds publicity to the motion under discussion. Let us stay by the constitution at least till it is amended. If the member who made this motion wishes to change the constitution, let him go about it the right way."

" Clifford (Ohio): "I am not voting

on the motion to prohibit preambles or comments on national referendums. This is a matter that should be taken up by the National Committee at its meeting in May."

Patterson (Ohio): "I am unable to see where Goebel or you have any authority to have the National Committee vote to amend the constitution."

mittee vote to amend the constitution, or where the National Committee is given this power. I trust you will declare this motion out of order and recall the ballot on same at once, or inform me where I will find any provision in the constitution justifying

your position.
"I vote No on Motion No. 1, as it "I vote No on Motion No. 1, as it is an amendment to the national constitution, and the National Committee has no authority to make such an amendment. The comment by Secretary Work and the correspondence between him and Comrade Goebel prove this beyond a doubt.

"Work repeatedly convicts himself of submitting a motion that is out of order, but thinks he is justified in submitting anything if it suits his notion of what ought to be. Then by this line of reasoning Work must also think he is at liberty to ignore any

think he is at liberty to ignore any motion he don't like.

"Whining Goebel admitted he was unable to follow the working of the National Secretary's logic. I think the membership of the party will agree with Goebel on that part of the argument.

Our National Secretary should have seen and understood the unfairness of printing on the individual ballots such matter as will assume the guilt of any comrade and he undoubtedly should have given Comrade Haywood a chance on that same ballot to answer, in a few words, the charges made and of which he was never tried. The ballot should have read: 'Shall William D. Hayhave read: 'Shall-William D. Hay-wood be recalled from the Socialist party?' and not from the National Executive Committee. This, in my opinion, was a piece of smooth work, political trickery, the product of one of our 'intellectuals' in having the motion read 'from the National Executive Committee' when there had been duties and functions on that committee. They feared they could not succeed in recalling him from the party. The charges were such, that if proven true, and in accordance with our constitution (another product of the trade union-intellectual faction), he should have been expelled from the party. I feel for our organization, however, when we begin such tactics; for they can only result in disruption. Let us read again the words of Helen Keller in the International Review for February, who sees and understands much better than many who are possessed of all their faculties. How true her warning and how noble her ideal of the relationship of comrades in a movement such as this. underhanded work is very much out of place in a movement like ours. Let us hope we will be more careful in the future and repair the damage we have done a worthy comrade."

Comment: "I have spent several Akron. There are 15,000 men and women on strike—mostly men and men who are American-born citizens. The usual citizens' committees been appointed, but they are doing unusual work. They are armed with clubs to beat the strikers. The preachers are more prominent in this fight against the workers than they have been in any fight of recent years. A preacher heads the Citizens' Committee, and is the most outspoken in advocacy of martial law. act has been read and the men are forbidden to picket. The special po-licemen and patriotic (?) citizens wear yellow badges. An automobile corps has been organized, and attempts to terrorize the strikers from early morning till late at night. The autos are used as gun carriages.

"The strikers are determined and courageous. They can be beaten by but one thing—starvation. The working class of America should see to it that they get help to hold out. They need help and they need it at once.

OFFICIAL REPORTS OF STATE CORRESPONDENTS.
Clara Ware, Arkansas, reports eight active committees with an increased interest in special propaganda work among the women of her state.

Mary E. Garbutt, California; Mrs. Anna Munz Kentucky; Marie Bayter

Anna Munz, Kentucky; Marie Baxter, North Dakota, and Eva Smith, Utah, make general reports but assure us that the results will show up to advantage in a few months. California held a number of splendid Woman's Day meetings.

Pauline Snyder, Connecticut; Alice M. West, Maine; Minna Ledyard, Vermont, and Annie Grigsby Lockwood, Michigan, have flooded their states with circular letters and literature. They report Woman's Day meetings in the larger cities and an awakened interest in our campaign of education.

Mrs. A. Schwartz, Georgia, reports a very small membership of women in

very small membership of women in her state, but thinks that the Lyceum lectures will assist in her work. "The Lyceum lecture in Augusta fell on Woman's Day with Comrade Anna A. Maley as speaker. We can all imagine the splendid results of this combination of circumstances. The capitalist press gave us a fine front page write-up of Comrade Maley's work. One-third of

the audience were women.' Zula J. Stallard, Kansas, reports 331 women members in the party with many locals not reporting. One local reports 58 women members, many have twenty or more. Three women organizers, Ethel Whitehead, Blanch G. Humphrey and Violet C. Evans are all at work

under the state office.

Laura I. Motley, Idaho, reports one new committee organized and a rousing "Woman's Day" meeting at Twin Falls.

May Walden, Illinois, reports many

names of sympathizers and the organi-several branch committees in Chicago and in many other points in the state. Comrade Walden is touring her state or-

ganizing women.

Lilith Martin, Indiana, reports that she has on file 250 names of women mem-bers. She reports many Woman's Day meetings and makes an interesting report on the suffrage petition, to the state Legislature, circulated by the Socialist party. After gathering thousands of names the party was faced with the problem of presentation to the Legislature. lature, having no Socialist member to do this. Union members elected while pledged to suffrage would hardly do justice to a petition circulated by an op-position party. So the petition was placed in the hands of the Woman's Franchise League of Indianapolis and presented in the form of a resolution. Expecting a courteous hearing before the commit-tee on suffrage, suffragists came from all over the state to present their arguments to the committee. But to their dismay the resolution was killed in committee before giving the petitioners a hearing. Comrade Martin reports that they are

ready to try again.

Hazel A. Smith, Nevada, reports a woman's law making committee that has drafted five bills and sent to the Socialist member of the state Legislature. Tonopah has twenty-five women members out of a membership of 175.

Grace Staub, Maryland, reports an euosmous meeting in Baltimore. The Jewish comrades co-operated with the

woman's committee in making Woman's Day a success from the standpoint of finances as well as new converts and interested sympathizers. Cumberland also had a fine meeting. Both these cities are organized on the ward line basis with a central body to carry on general work which cannot be done by the ward branches.

Martha Edgerton Plassmann, who has been assisting the state secretary during the campaign, is again at work. She reports "all organizers in the field are making a special effort to induce women to come into the movement." Montana is a big state and very sparcely settled. It will probably be one of the next to extend the franchise to women.

Elsie Henry Latimer, Minnesota, reports 29 active woman's committees and more coming.

Viola Gilbert Snell, Oregon, one of the newer elected correspondents, cannot report on committees by sympathizers as yet. But, like Washington, they are concentrating the newly enfranchised women in a school campaign. They have a state educational, committee and are co-operating with the National Teachers Bureau in the national office.

Mrs. M. A. Stallard, Oklahoma, has but recently been elected state correspondent and is planning a campaign of propaganda among women of her state. Hortense Wagenknecht, Washington, reports 110 local committees and the list constantly growing. The six state of
