AMALGAMATED SPREADS OUT.

KENDALL, Mont., May 28.—It is reliably reported that the Amalgamated Copper Company has bought the famous Barnes King mine at this place. This is the first time the Amalgamated has engaged in other than copper mining. Its gold and silver output being merely by-products of the Butte mines. Its entrance into the gold field has occasioned much comment in mining circles.
