## Second National Convention of Workers Party Makes History in American Class Struggle

The Second National Convention of the Workers Party, just held in New York City, shows that the American Communist movement has developed that instrument of the American workers' movement, and that the masses are coming to the aid of the party.

For the first time in the history of the American revolution, the party has organized its own party, and has taken the first step toward the organization of the workers to win the day in the ultimate transformation of the world.

C. E. R. Report Presented

Secretary Ruthenberg read the report of the Central Executive Committee since its first convention two months ago. The report showed the growth of the party organization, the average membership for March, April, May and June being 14,556 members, and for July, August, September and October it had gone up to 15,394, the dues payments for October showing 14,556 members. In the reports for November and December 15,394 members were shown.

"It is a safe estimate," declares the report, "that with all the new membership added to the party through the Chicago-Slovak Federation, the American Federation, and the United Brotherhood, that the dues-paying membership of the party at the end of December and January will total 20,000."

The report makes a special appeal for the building up of the English-speaking membership of the party to 16 foreign language federations. It also points out the need of joining the party in the near future, that in the words of Secretary Ruthenberg, we will have a substantial party all our own.

The Second Convention of the Workers Party is over. The party comes out of this convention a militant, revolutionary party and with greatly increased strength.

The delegates who had the privilege of participating in the thrashing proceedings and listening to the reports and resolutions and discussion on these felt that the party had consolidated itself, that it was moving forward with new impetus and vigor.

The result of this method of handling the business before the convention was an enlightening discussion during which a common understanding was arrived at. As a consequence, practically every resolution was adopted unanimously at the close of the debate, although wide differences of opinion sometimes manifested themselves during the debate.

The convention approved the policy of the Central Executive Committee in regard to the party. It confirmed the policy to be followed in the new campaign for the Labor Party. ### Progressive Miners Have Winning Lead

During the sessions of the Workers Party Convention Delegate Fred H. Merrick, from Pittsburgh, received several telegrams from J. H. Hamilton, of the Pittsburgh Miners' Relief Committee, announcing that the progressive candidates were making a big lead over the reactionists in the miners' union election.

The latest wire received stated that Merrick, the progressive candidate, had received 6,303 votes out of a total return of 9,772, leaving 3,469 for his opponent Vagan. This 9,772 vote was 2,634 votes ahead of the reactionists, with some of the candidates for other places being even better. Spontaneous applause greeted Merrick's announcement of these results at the convention.

The reactionists, on the other hand, were led in the journal by the American Bar Association, H. L. Sweeney, chairman of the Social Law Library of this city, who during the trial of Sacco and Vanzetti at Dedham, Mass., the town was converted into an armed camp.

"The leadership in the international struggle which inspires hope in the hearts of the workers of the world and arouses fear in the capitalists of every country is the leadership of the Communist International."

"The Workers Party declares its sympathy with the principles of the Communist International and enters the struggle against American capitalism, the most powerful of the national groups, under the inspiration of the leadership of the Communist International.

"It rallies to the call 'WORKERS OF THE WORLD UNITE!'"

"Following the adoption of this declaration the delegates and the audience joined enthusiastically in the singing of the "International" and then proceeded to the reading of the proposed party program by Secretary Rubenberg. It was then taken up for discussion.
