Mystery Shrouds Why Does LaFollette Not Split?

The so-called "radical" group in the United States has made a fight against the ruling majority. For two days they blocked the election of the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Their demand was greater representation of the "radical" element in Congress. But they quit.

Quitting, respectively, before Congress was in session on the open floor.

The whole country looked on with great interest and great excitement. The so-called "radical" group had announced months back that it would fight as never before. For nine months there was no session of Congress. For nine months "radicals" talked of a fight with vociferous bragging, like managers of boxing boxes before some championship match. For nine months the "radicals" promised they would fight, and then they fought for two days.

The compromise of the radicals is a betrayal, not only of their promises, but also of the masses who elected them. The radical Republicans and Democrats made the election fight everywhere against the ruling administration. They control the two old parties. They are in duty bound to fight, and they are in a position to make the fight under favorable circumstances. Never has the situation been as favorable as today. The conservative New York Times had to admit before the opening of the present Sixty-eighth Congress:

"In all the history of the United States has never assembled a Congress such as the one which will meet... it will be a Congress of minorities, a Congress in which the Republicans will have a paper majority, only a Congress in which the regular Republicans and the old-line Democrats will be just about tied, so far as membership is concerned, a Congress in which a well-organized, able group, calling themselves Progressive, will hold the balance of power in both Houses."

The New York Times tells the truth: The so-called radicals and progressives hold the balance of power in both Houses of Congress. They have the power and it is their duty to utilize this power.

A mighty class-struggle is raging throughout the United States. Big capital is expropriating millions of farmers and driving them off their land. The working class is being, for the most part, unorganized, toward an industrial crisis and serious unemployment. The imperialism of the international bankers and trusts wants to lead the United States once more into new world entanglements into new world wars. The army and navy preparedness is going forward apace. The taxes of the poor farmers are growing to an unbearable degree. The cost of living of the workers is on the increase. The criminal tariff renders the monopoly trusts on industrial products the greatest menace against the life of the whole nation.

South Dakota Farmer-Labor Party Starts National Drive for 1924

Unity of City and Land Workers

EDITORIAL NOTE: The Farmer-Labor Party has taken the first definite step in the drive for the Farmer-Labor Party for the 1924 presidential election. The South Dakota Farmer-Labor Party refused to fuse with the Democratic Party in the 1922 election. It held its own, and in the 1922 election it nominated a full ticket of its own, and endorsed the effort of the Federated Farmer-Labor Party to secure a national united front of all farmer-labor groups. The story of the Pierre, S. Dak., Farmer-Labor Party, written especially for "The Worker" by Joseph Manley, secretary of the Federated Farmer-Labor Party, is as follows:

PIERRE, S. DAK.—Out here in the "Sunshine State," at a former French trading post, situated on the bluffs of the great Missouri River with a surrounding country peopled with Indians, cowboys, ranchers and farmers in the heart of the "last Great West," where the bankrupt farmers are making their last stand against the steadily encroaching power of capitalism, that thru its bankers and politicians is destroying the life and hope of the farmer, was staged a party which represents all of the political forces of modern American life.

The setting itself dramatized the whole fight. On one side of the tracks "up on the hill" is situated the Capitol, a beautiful building that milions of Italian marble staircases and expensive fittings, all of which is in great contrast with the frame houses of the town and the vast plains on all sides. The next important modern building and situated close to the Capitol on the same side of the tracks and on the same "hill" is the hotel, the joint headquarters of the republican and democratic "down below the hill," and on the other side of the tracks, in an old ramshackle hotel built many years ago to accommodate the people. It housed the 300 delegates and visitors to the Farmer-Labor Party convention. Most of us had to sleep under strictly proletarian conditions as the delegates to the convention.

To get the full significance of the struggle it is well to recall a few facts: South Dakota is the home of Senator Sterling (of espionage fame), a faithful servant of capitalism, has brought the state, its farmers and workers to a bankrupt condition. Its population of 700,000 is 80 per cent agricultural. In the last 34 years the population of the state increased 100 per cent and taxation increased 4,000 per cent. The old Republican machine has held its grip on the farmers and workers by the most ruthless kind of exploitation, the remainder of the state and the party ticket in the primaries, which goes to the state and the remainder to the country. Should the country try to economize, for instance by dispensing with the services of a superintendent at the legal salary of \$2,000 per year, his duties are ostensibly to inspect the county roads but he is invariably a bench-

Workers Aroused by Challenge to Probe Communism

The challenge of the Workers Party of America to take up the program of the Lewis machine of the United Mine Workers of America and appoint a committee to investigate the Communist movement in the United States has stirred a great deal of interest among the workers of this country. Large meetings have been held in most of the principal cities in which representatives of the Workers Party spoke, urging that the investigation be undertaken.

E. Rutenberg, a Jewish English and Jew Loveston made flying trips to various sections of the country, which were aimed at to enable them to address meetings during the opening week of Congress, at which to present the Communist movement with the proposal for the investigation was made.

The speakers, in each instance, stated that they did not believe that Congress would accept the challenge, and proceeded to tell the workers which were urged so to enable them to say for themselves if such an investigation was made.

"We do not care what the Social of the United States thinks about Communism," declared C. E. Rutenberg, speaking before an audience of the Lewis machine of the United Temple in Philadelphia. "We do not care what any part of the government of Washington thinks about Communism. But we do care about what the workers of this country think about Communism and we know that a congressional investigation would result in the workers learning more about the Communist movement and in building up that group of militant workers which will wipe out the 'trust' system in this country. Therefore, we are for the investigation."

All of Rutenberg's meetings drew extraordinary throngs.

The Amalgamated Clothing Workers' Union is conducting an organization drive in St. Louis, Mo., with considerable success.

One of the interesting developments of this struggle is the disclosure that St. Louis Socialists, thru their paper "St. Louis Labor," are making a "regular" appearance in the streets.

"Some time ago we called the attention of our readers to the fact that the clothing manufacturers of St. Louis, for many years, purposely failed to maintain friendly relations with District Council of the United Workers."

Allies of Murder

Twenty-five thousand coal miners murdered in 10 years? 1,433 miners murdered during the first 10 months of 1922? 2,059 miners murdered during the same 10 months of 1923?

The Raleigh-Wyoming Coal Co., blamed by a coroner's jury at Charleston, W. Va., for the murder of 27 miners at its Glen Rogers mine Nov. 6.

Economy stunts by the C. W. Neff Mining Co.'s huge Orient mine near Franklin, Ill., claimed two, a third burned fatally, and four others badly burned on Nov. 26.

Three miners drowned at the Radium mine near Belleville, Ill., Dec. 6, when weak walls give way, with 28 others barely escaping the flood.

Seven miners dead and six others injured in dust explosion at mine of Blackhawk Coal Co., near Hazard, Ky., Dec. 8.

And so the story goes on from day to day. A paragraph is enough to record each case in the daily press.

Dr. John B. Andrews, secretary, American Association for Labor Legislation, says that two-thirds of the fatal and serious accidents in the soft coal fields can be prevented by law.

But the mine owners will continue with their "economy stunts" at the expense of miners' lives until they are forced to abandon them. Yet John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers' Union, with his wholehearted, if too busy fighting the progressives in the organization to give attention to the crimes of the bosses.

Lewis is thus a big ally of the mine owners in their murderous policy that has brought death to 25,000 coal miners in 10 years; death to 2,059 during the first 10 months of this year.

Gompers charged that international bankers were not opposed to recognition of Soviet Russia. We showed that at least a score of big bankers were found in the list of names attached to the Gompers-National Civic Federation proclamation against Soviet recognition.

Gompers charged "sharp practices" on the part of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers' Bank in transmitting money to Soviet Russia. This charge was shown to be a deliberate and unfounded fabrication.

Gompers charged U.S. Senator King with getting a concession from the Soviet Government, claiming that this accounted for King's favorable attitude toward Russian Workers' Rule. But Senator King has blasted this fairy tale. And all this in one short week!

Thus do all of Gompers' ambitions to rival Baron Munchausen fall by the wayside. Gompers is exposed as a cheap liar and the value of his attacks on the militant has fallen to the worth of a German mark.

He will soon be another useless weapon in the depleted armory of the labor hating bosses.

Privately Owned Industry Takes Huge Toll from Workers

The estimated annual number of industrial accidents is 2,435,418 and the total number of working days lost is \$27,469,970.

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Problems of the German Revolution: Trade Unions, Factory Committees and Workers' Councils

The counter-revolutionary role of the German trade unions during the imperialist war was the main reason why they were driven into German workers into the army of Wilhelm II, and they made it seem as if the German workers were in the hands of Socialism by defending the "fatherland" of Wilhelm II.

It is, indeed, hardly an exaggeration to say that during the years 1914-1919 the German trade unions were the most important factor of the counter-revolution.

The German trade unions are today still very much of a factor of the counter-revolution, at least, if we consider the actual machine of the trade unions and its leaders.

There is not the slightest doubt that in the decisive moment the German workers will see the leaders of the German trade unions again on the opposite side of the barricades.

The seizure of the apparatus of the German trade unions will appear no easier to the German working class than the seizure of the state apparatus.

It seems that the German working class will succeed in taking possession of the trade unions only after a successful revolution.

In fact, the case even in a country where the influence of Menshevism was comparatively slight, namely, in Russia, there was a time when quite a considerable group within the Communist International instinctively demanded the withdrawal of the trade unions and workers' organizations with them from the revolutionary struggle.

The Congress of the Communist International, even such far-reaching measures as the destruction was accomplished absolutely upon withdrawing the Central Committee from the Communist International put up a most determined resistance to all these tendencies, and there is no doubt that the Communist International will soon grow up in finest fashion.

It was no accident that the victory of the German communists in the elections to the Reichstag in 1933 was the earliest dawn to light the way for the counter-revolutionary dark Socialism of the counter-revolution.

There is no doubt that in the approaching working class revolution in Germany the factory committees will play an even more important role than the German Communist Party.

The laboring masses gradually merged the industrial councils into the workers' councils, but also of the Proudshonist distortion of revolutionary Marxism.

The spirit of the true class struggle begins to infiltrate into the factory councils. The factory councils expand enormously all over Germany. Gradually, they take over all those functions rejected by the yellow trade unions, and not only these are indissolubly bound up with the preparation of the proletarian revolution, and which render the German factory councils today similar to the workers' Soviets of the epoch of seizure of power.

The yellow leaders of the trade unions must designate their "chairmen" for the central executive committees of the factory councils.

In Berlin the notorious Emil Barth forces himself in this role—the "Socialist minister" of the first revolutionary Schramm-Haase cabinet. This self-faced knight contrives to appear in the role of a minister of the factory councils.

As a time when as a matter of fact the factory councils have long since outstripped the Social Democracy, and have collaborated with Communist Party of Germany and Company to the detriment of the proletarian revolution.

The factory committees are recruited from the "lower sections" of the shops, industries, factories, mines, railroad depots, great commercial and industrial concerns of Germany with a thick network.

During the last year the factory committees have increased in number to the point where they are today, day to day.
