Living Cost Swinging Upward


A perusal of the latest figures on the cost of living issued by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics will dispel whatever llusions one might have about the direction in which the price of

the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics will dispel whatever illusions one might have about the direction in which the price of food stuffs is travelling.

From Oct. 15 to Nov. 15, 1923, there was an increase in the cost of living in 22 out of 28 cities investigated. The rise was as high as 3 per cent during the month in certain localities.

For the year ending Nov. 15, 1923, the bureau found an increase in the cost of living in all of the 28 cities. In the city of Chicago the price of food stuffs rose 8 per cent during, the year. In the big industrial centers the workers are paying 50 to 60 per cent more for their food than they paid before the war.
