James Wellwood, of Cadillac, Mich., died recently, and when his will was read it was found that he had left his entire estate, valued at \$10,000, to the Socialist party.

A bill has been introduced in the Wisconsin legislature to give the right of suffrage to all persons of foreign birth who have declared their intention to become citizens. The bill also includes the right of suffrage to women.

State-wide prohibition will take place in Utah and Arkansas in 1916 as the result of legislation in those states.

A compromise has taken place between the employers and employees of the American Agricultural Chemical Co., of Roosevelt, N. J. The men struck against a reduction of wages from \$2.00 to \$1.60 a day. The men have gone back to work for \$1.80 a day.
