THE People's Front government in Spain represents a government of those parties who are in the best position to pursue an aggressive and unfaltering campaign against the murderous Fascist forces.

The People's Front government is a better reflection of the relation of forces actually engaged on the field of battle against the mutineer forces of the Spanish Fascist generals and large landowners. The proletariat and peasantry, bearing the brunt of the fierce attacks by the Fascist forces, are now more actively in the leadership of the people's armed forces.

Capitalist papers are declaring that the present government is a Socialist, or Communist government, with the abolition of the capitalist system as its immediate aim. But then, they have been saying that ever since the Fascist mutiny began.

The People's Front government has the same aim its predecessor had: that of defending the democratic rights of the people against Fascists; to preserve the Republican government, duly elected to the polls. There is no basic change in the character of the

doubt the pro-Fascist elements throughout the world hoped that the establishment of the People's Front government marks a rift in the anti-Fascist forces. The Fascists, however, were doomed to disappointment. All parties which have fought in defense of democracy in Spain have pledged their full support to the People's Front government. More, they welcome the establishment of this government as one better able, under the present circumstancs, to defeat the Fascist enemies of Spain.

Inspired by the People's Front government, we can now look for decisive blows against the Spanish Fascists by the People's Militia.

The establishment of this government, and its logical consequence of stiffening the fight THE Mayor of the City of San Francisco fore cannot analyze this to see this candidate, leaving aside all All progressive people, all lovers of democracy must redouble their efforts in support of the embattled Spanish anti-Fascists.

Trade unions and other progressive organizations should pass resolutions calling on our State Department to recognize in fact, and deal with, the government which the Fascist mutineers are trying to overthrow.

Collection of funds for the Spanish anti-Fascists must be speeded. The civil war is in its final and critical stage.

Can Labor Support Palmer?

THE DEFEAT in the primaries of Grover Johnson, non-partisan candidate for the office of District Attorney of Los Angeles County, robs the progressives and friends of labor of the opportunity of supporting a candidate whose whole record is that of battling for the rights of organized labor-both in the court room and in the field. Around such a candidate there could have been built a really broad united front movement to defeat Fitts, the reactionary incumbent.

Now the only opponent against Fitts is Harlan Palmer, liberal editor of the Hollywood "Citizen-News."

It is of the utmost importance that Fitts' record be repudiated at the polls and Fitts defeated in November. The most effective weapon to defeat Fitts would be the immediate adoption and putting into effect by Harlan Palmer of a labor policy which would make possible the united support of all labor and progressive organizations to defeat Fitts.

Mr. Palmer has made some very liberalstatements: against the Criminal Syndicalism law, for example, and other anti-labor legislation. But the progressive and labor forces, who know Fitts for the vicious labor-hating, prosecutor that he is, want more definite commitment of policy than that. His stand, especially, on the right of workers to organize, strike and picket without interference from the employers and their agents, in or out of uniform.

Such decisive commitment is necessary. But first, Palmer should take steps to "clean house" himself. His newspaper plant is a non-union shop. Palmer should see to it that

The Spanish People's Front Gov- his plant is unionized. This is the first step he should take to convince labor that he is friendly to their aims. He might also send an invitation to the Newspaper Guild to send an organizer to sign up his editorial staff.

Green and Farmer-Labor Party

BVIOUSLY one of the developments inside the American Federation of Labor which is highly annoying to William Green is the rapidly crystallizing sentiment for a Farmer-Labor Party. The fact that the leadership of this movement has been assumed by the progressive industrial unions headed by John L. Lewis does not make this development any easier for Mr. Green to

Green's Labor Day speech was sharply directed against the Farmer-Labor Party movement. Green says he believes that organized labor, which is at present a minority of the people could never expect to pass labor laws through independent political action. He adheres to the Gompers policy of attempting to use the organized labor movement as a "a balance of power" between parties and candidates to get concessions.

This "balance of power" theory in reality furnishes Green and his allies in the top leadership of the A.F.L. with a stock for political trading,—and actually ties the A. F.L. executive council more closely to political office holders than to the rank and file of organized labor.

Lewis, Dubinsky, Hillman and other leaders of the Committee for Industrial Organization realize this keenly. Mill Co. Reports \$76.000 Profit: Pleads "Poverty"

OAKLAND-Pleas of poverty Francisco: Chronicle's "Safety by the California Cotton Mills are not borne out by official financial reports.

While the management was putting on the "speed-up" and lengthening hours of work of toilers in 1935, it was swelling its profits over the preceding year.

The company reported that its 935 net profit was \$76,300 after depreciation. During the year it cleared defaulted interest, and fund requirements.

But Workers Get 28c

Quite a neat financial trick while its workers were drawing 44 hour week and union recog as low as 28 cents an hour. Sales of the California Cotton Mills last year totaled \$2,882,203, compared with \$2,689,541 in 1934. t ended the year owning 60,000 shares of National Automotive Fibres Class A stock, carried on the books at \$5 a share. The company revealed it had options outstanding for sale of 19,000 shares for \$782,500.

FIFTY UNIONS AID STRIKERS **DESPITE COPS**

600 Hold Solidarity Action At Calif. Cotton Mill

OAKLAND-Six hundred men and women, representing 50 different unions, showed their solidarity by joining in a demonstration Friday afternoon at the California Cotton Mills in Oakland, where workers have been on strike more than three months.

One hundred police drove back the demonstrators, and as the peaceful crowd retreated, a police club cracked on the back of one of the women picketers. Police Escort Scabs

Scabs were escorted through the lines of demonstrators by police, but they saw plenty of evidence that union labor is united behind the courageous strikers. Police arrested one of the pickets and rushed him to the police station.



People's Health

By Franklin E. Bissell, M. D.

DIABETES

Santa Barbara, Calif, August 13, 1936.

Dear Dr. Bissell:

MY NEIGHBOR friend and subscriber to W. W. is developing what I think is a fear complex—brought on by everal operations for firstly, asthma and later diabetes. She s too fat, but not from inactivity (in face she is desperately ctive), and a year ago she was threatened with blindness.

She was advised to cut out bread stuffs and sugar-with great enefit. Now she is becoming highly nervous again and the

lindness she feared is returning. She as been advised to try insulin as a last esort. I advised citrus and other fruit uices but she fears the sugar in them. sn't that better than insulin? How bout spinach, tomatoes, beets and carots? There must be some bulky foods, nust there not?

M.R.R., Subscriber.

ANSWER-If your friend has sugar in er urine, the oncoming blindness is probably either due to a diabetic cataract, which is a haziness of the lens of the ye, or a diabetic retinitis, a disease of he eye-ground.

The pancreas is a gland situated near he stomach. This gland, among other

unctions, supplies the substance, insulin, to the blood-stream. The insulin helps to turn the sugar which we eat into fat and assists he body in burning the sugar to get the energy that it needs. When the pancreas, from some unknown reason ceases to produce enough insulin, the sugar remains unburned in the blood and causes a great deal of trouble. This condition is called Diapetes. The most frequent sign of it is sugar in the urine, which is free from thus substance under normal conditions.

If diabetes is not properly treated, it is bound to get worse. It can be treated either by regulating the amount of sugar consumer or by the injection of artificial insulin, or by both. The test as to whether the disease is being treated properly or not is whether or not sugar appears in the urine.

In any case it is impossible for a person to treat himself unless he is under medical supervision. The first step in the treatment is to establish the right diet for the patient. If sugar appears in his urine in spite of reducing the diet to the smallest amounts possible, then the patient must take insulin as well. This method of establishing the treatment requires that the patient stay in bed for a while.

If your friend cannot afford to have this rather extensive work done by a private doctor, see that the county hospital does it for her. There are many methods of establishing the right diet and the right amount of insulin, but the above method is the one most generally used. If the doctors at the county hospital or clinic cannot free her urine of sugar within a week, the demand should be made that she be taken into the hospital until the urine is sugar-free. It may be necessary to take a committee to the authbrities in order to back up the demand. Show them this article,

When the diet is established, it must be strictly followed. Certain fruits and vegetables in limited quantity may be included. The fruits and vegetables that you mentioned have large quantities of sugar and should not be taken except as specified by a doctor,


