HARTFORD, Conn .- In the state of Connecticut it is against the law to employ children under sixteen but this law does not mean anything to the bosses of the Screw Shop. They sight with the bible; now they will pretend to keep within the law by merely asking the children who are forced at an early age to leave school, in an off hand manner their age and so we find quite a few children working under extremely unhealthy con-

For instance the children have to work at oily machines. It is a well known fact that oil spoils your stomach and stunts your growth and the consequences are that after a few years at the screw shop one is a physical wreck and the bosses have no more use for you.

The new method of the bosses to get the most out of the workers for the least possible wage is piece work. it seems at first that the bosses are giving the workers a chance to earn more by a little extra effort, but as soon as the workers threaten to make a fair day's pay, down come the rates. The acrew shop is no exception.

Clothing Workers Toil Under Terrible Conditions

A. C. W. A. ORGANIZING SHOP

By AL. JOHNSON.

TRENTON, N. J.—The Simpson Clothing Company of 116 Factory St .. occupying the second and third floors of that building, having forced upon ground of the Negro workers probtheir employes the following unbearorganized by the Amalgamated Clothing Workers.

Normally there are employed approximately 165 workers, mostly young girls who fear to enter the cloak-room, it being infested with large sewer rats. The lighting effects are such as to cause undue eye strain. the windows having never been washtoilet-rooms are to be found the most unsanitary conditions, one in particular, that of the water-closets becomflowing over on to the floor. Pieces of cloth are laid about to absorb this and the odor arising from this is not very pleasant to the nostrils. There is a speed-up system employed whereby tickets are fastened on to the cloth or placed in the pockets of the clothing, and as each worker finishes his or her part they remove these tickets and turn them into the office at the end of the week. In this way, the manager is kept infromed of the the day. The hours of employment are 49 per week with piece work being the compulsory order of the day wherever possible. With the greatest of efforts leading to a maddening pace the highest possible wage is \$35.00 pace-makers, a very few indeed are given \$50.00 per week. These figures are the wages of the men; the wages of the girls are considerably lower barely sufficient to provide the necessities of life. When a new season commences, after being employed two weeks and having received only one week's pay, the workers note that their wages have been reduced without being notified. And when they



There are thousands of unorganized young workers in the printing industry in Chicago. The big plants which operate strictly as open shops do so by employing mostly young workers whom they try to keep unorganized and force to work for the lowest wages. Even certain large "so-called" union shops, shops which carry the union isbel and have a few skilled union men working there, have five unorganized young workers to one union man, and sometimes the ratio in an high an 8 to 1.

2. Acceptance of any young worker working at the trade into the uhion (Typographical or binders) with full privileges and at lower initiation fee than the older workers.

At the present time, with printing developed from a handicraft into a huge industry, employing more than 25,000 workers in Chicago, a large per centage of whom are unskilled, effective organization in the industry is closely bound up with the problem of organizing the many unskilled and ufforganized young workers in the innever be accomplished unless besides dustry. However, this huge task can conducting an intensive campaign to organize these young workers, the union makes it casy for them to get in by lowering the initiation fee and accepting them directly into the union with full privileges as members. At the present time there is usually only one or two union men on a machine and perhaps one apprentice, all the rest being, considered outside the jurisdiction of the union. However, the union cannot expect to control the job until all of those helpers in the founderies, press rooms and print rhops are organized, and instead of only a small perceptage in the shop being organized we will have 100 per cent organization.

ATTENDANCE AT RUSSIA'S HIGHER

SCHOOLS CONSTANTLY INCREASING

WHILE tens of thousands of American working class children never reach high school because they are forced into industry by a pitiless ruling class, the workers of Russia are enjoying the faults of their toil and the benefits of a superior education for themselves and especially for their children.
